

Chiropractic affords the greatest opportunity today of any business or profession for the attainment of your highest ideals and ambitions.

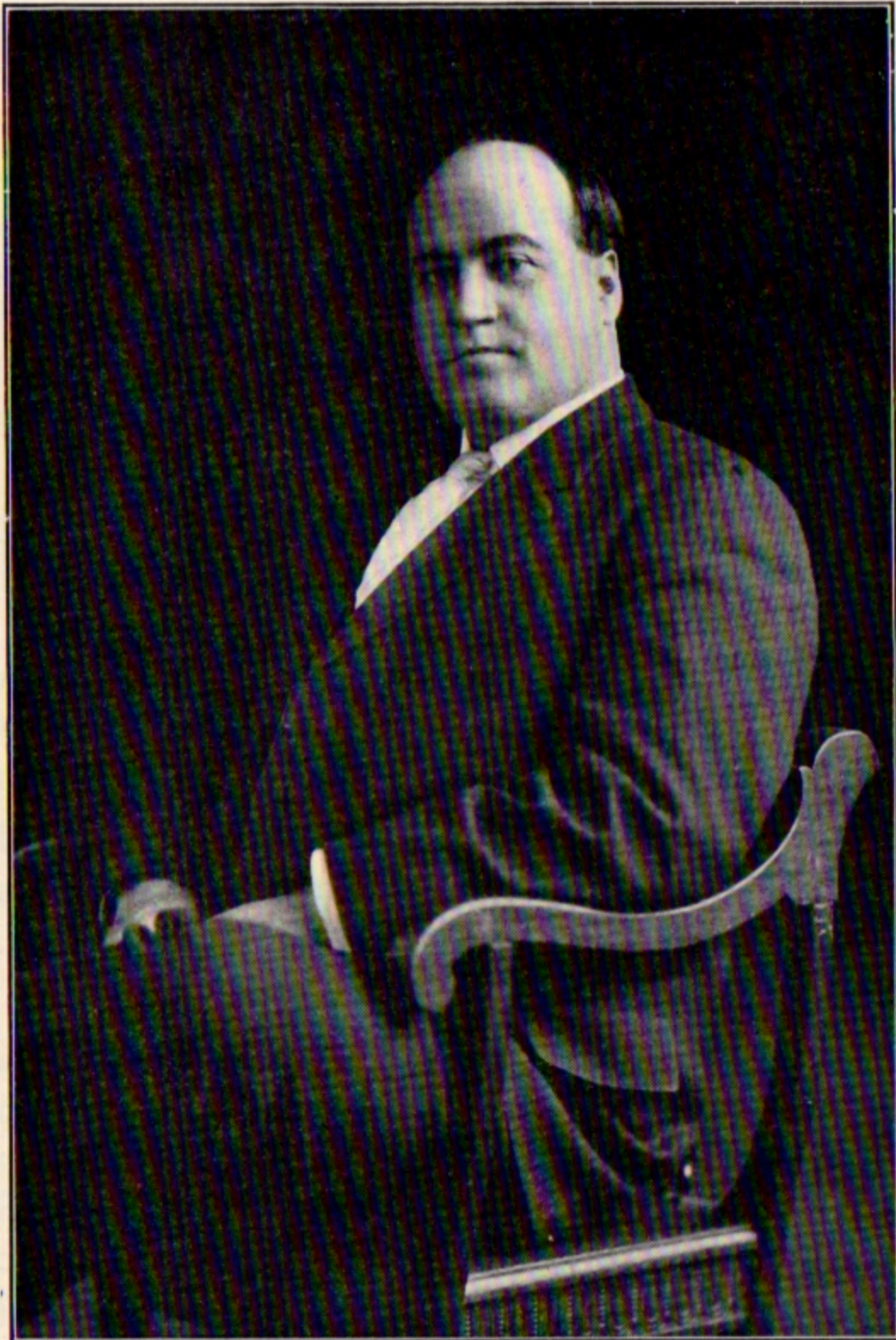

The Pacific Chiropractic College

SEVENTEEN years ago, the need of skilled and well grounded Chiropractic physicians became so great, and the supply was so small, that the Pacific Chiropractic College was founded in Portland, Ore. The men who initiated it knew the demand for this great science of *Healing Without Drugs*, but they lacked, as most pioneers do, the broad knowledge and the business and executive ability which is necessary to establish it firmly upon its feet. However, those early days of privation and disappointment may have been necessary, for by struggle and trouble and striving toward a high ideal are the foundations of all great scholastic enterprises laid deep and true.

The turning point for the Pacific Chiropractic College came in 1915, when Dr. Oscar W. Elliott became president of the institution. Almost immediately the stormy waves subsided, the winds of financial stress ceased to blow so violently, and with his steady and competent hand upon the helm, it righted itself and vindicated his faith in it as an institution filled with the rosier possibilities, not only for its own good and for the good of its students, but for the benefit of all mankind.

That might, perhaps, be considered the first milestone for the Pacific Chiropractic College. The second, in the ownership of its permanent home.

Our Home on Grand Avenue

In the past it has occupied excellent quarters, but all of them have left something to be desired in convenience or size or location. Our permanent site could not be more admirable for the purpose. The building stands facing the east on Grand Avenue, within easy reach of the business section of Portland, and yet far enough removed to escape the din of business and the distractions of downtown streets. It is situated in an excellent and favored residence center, where luxury, leisure and the peace that collegiate existence demands, unite.

The building is of the most approved architecture, in massive Mission style, and is eminently suited to its purpose and plan. It stands at 125 Grand Avenue North, a little

removed from the corner of East Hoyt Street. At the entrance, two small but stately potted cedars rear their sombre heads and give the severe outlines of the structure a still greater atmosphere of dignity.

As you pass through the spacious Main Entrance, you notice that the floors and woodwork are of beautifully grained oak, which lends a distinctive charm, and blends perfectly with the creamy tints of walls and ceilings.

On the right of the Entrance Hall is the Business Office, with a wide archway connecting. In the rear is the private office of President Elliott, with a consulting office adjoining.

To the left is a spacious Reception Hall, the soft, indirect lighting and comfortable furnishings making it a most attractive and desirable place for the reception of visitors and guests.

Immediately in front of the entrance is the office of the Dean.

On the main floor are ample accommodations for the reception and convenience of officers, professors, teachers, assistants, students and visitors.

Class Rooms Delightful

Let us ascend the wide stairway to the second floor, for here the actual study and research is conducted. Two ample classrooms occupy the entire south end of this second story. These have been constructed and furnished with the same studious care and attention to detail as that devoted to the lower floor. Scrupulously sanitary they are, and yet the harshness common to so many classrooms has been avoided by a simple, classical grace of outline and artistic ability in furnishing that soothe and stimulate the optic nerve, prevent eye strain, and make attendance a pleasure, and studiousness a delight rather than a duty.

The rest of this floor is devoted to an Open Clinic, a Private Clinic, an admirable and completely equipped Laboratory, Locker Rooms, Cloak Rooms, and the like. Each is constructed with the twin ideas of perfect utility and perfect beauty, for Dr. Elliott believes

that the two may be united most beneficially, in the home, in the sick room, in the office and in the scholastic institution where earnest young men and women are fitted for a life of both service and profit.

Within such surroundings the mind is lifted up in contemplation of the lofty calling whose tenets are taught, and the substantial knowledge and technique essential to a successful career is acquired smoothly, easily and adequately.

A word must be said of the man whose keen judgment, wide experience and ample intellectual attainments have made the Pacific Chiropractic College a success.

Dr. Oscar W. Elliott is a college man, born and reared in the South, and endowed with all the innate courtesy and instinctive tact of his birthplace. He was seasoned in the West, and he readily took on the big, hospitable spirit which typifies the great Occident. Combined with these is his deep love for Humanity, which has inspired him to devote his life to the alleviation of human ills and do all for it that his big soul can conceive. Dear Sir:

It gives me pleasure to advise you that your institution has been duly approved by the Secretary of Labor as a school for immigrant students under the Immigration Act of 1924. The Department of State has been notified of this action for the information of American consular officers, who will then be in a position to consider applications for the required non quota student visas.

There are inclosed herewith several copies of a Bureau circular explaining the status of students under the Act referred to which may be of value to you in communications with applicants. You will note that the matter of issuing visas is entirely in the hands of American consuls. In other words, this Department and Bureau have no part in the procedure after a school is approved until applicants for admission as students reach a United States port.

It is unnecessary to communicate with the Bureau relative to the expected arrival of individual students. However, it probably would be helpful in many cases if the immigration officer in charge at the port of arrival could be informed as to the date and ship on which students are expected to come, together with any evidence which may be available showing that such persons have definitely arranged to enter the school concerned.

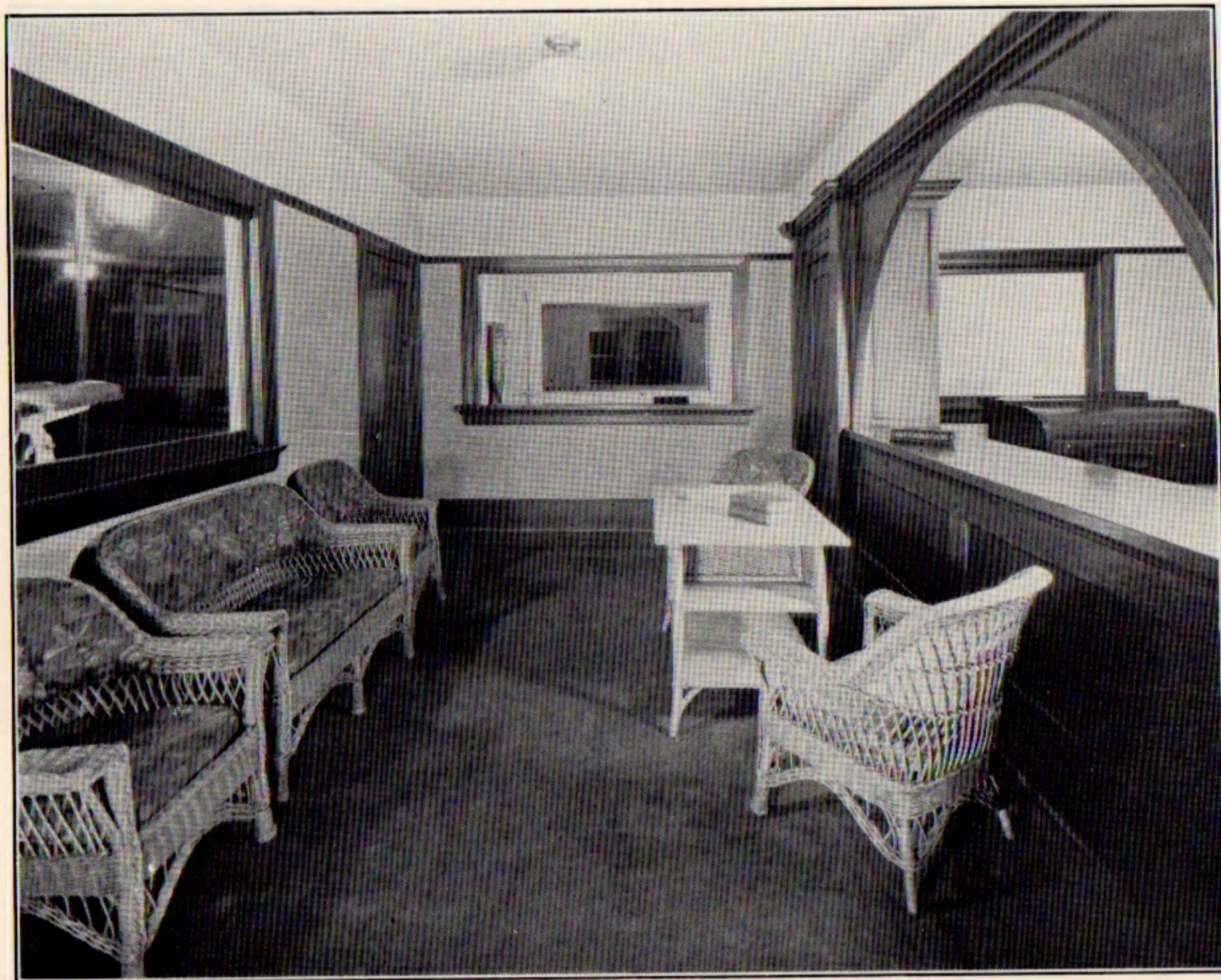

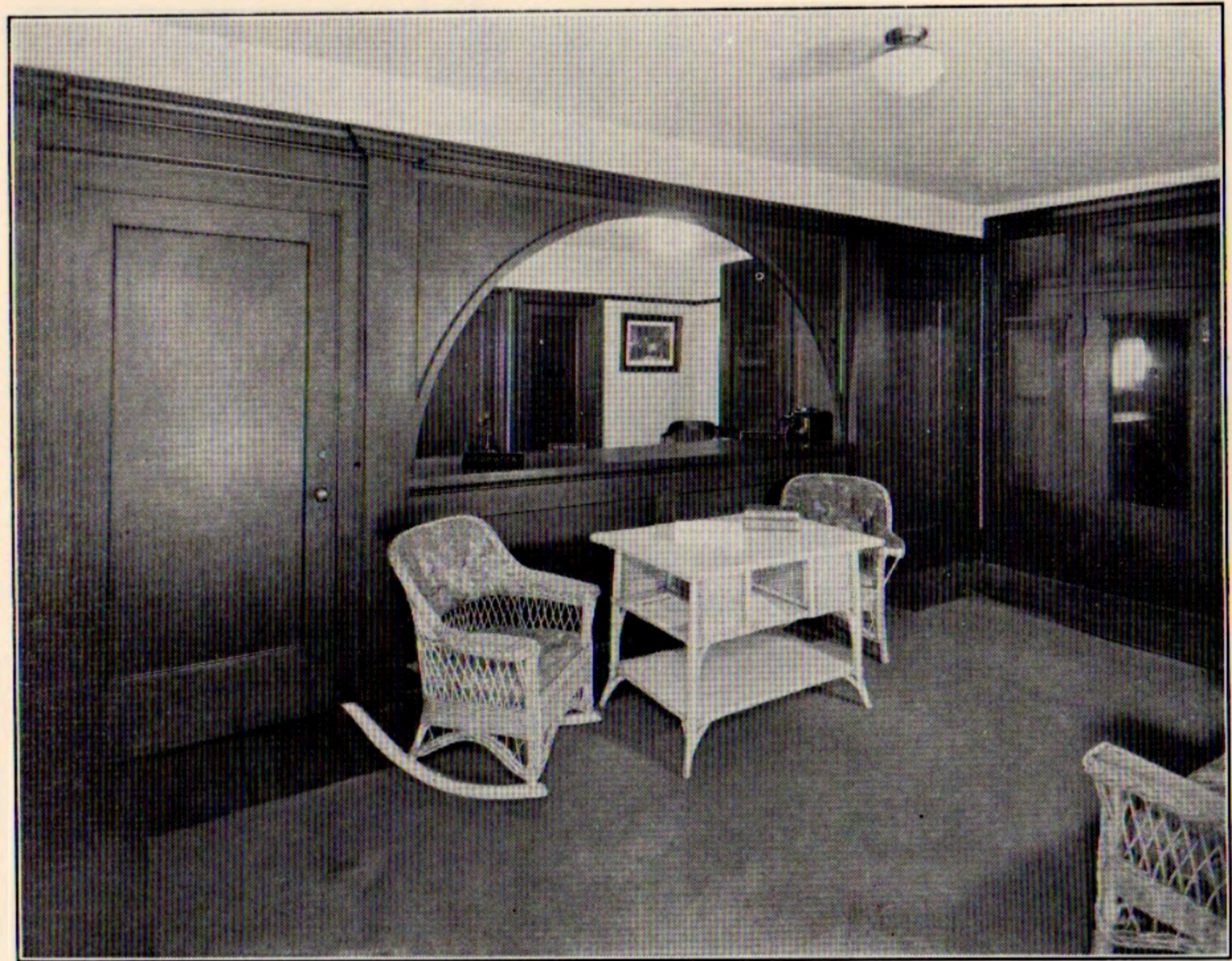

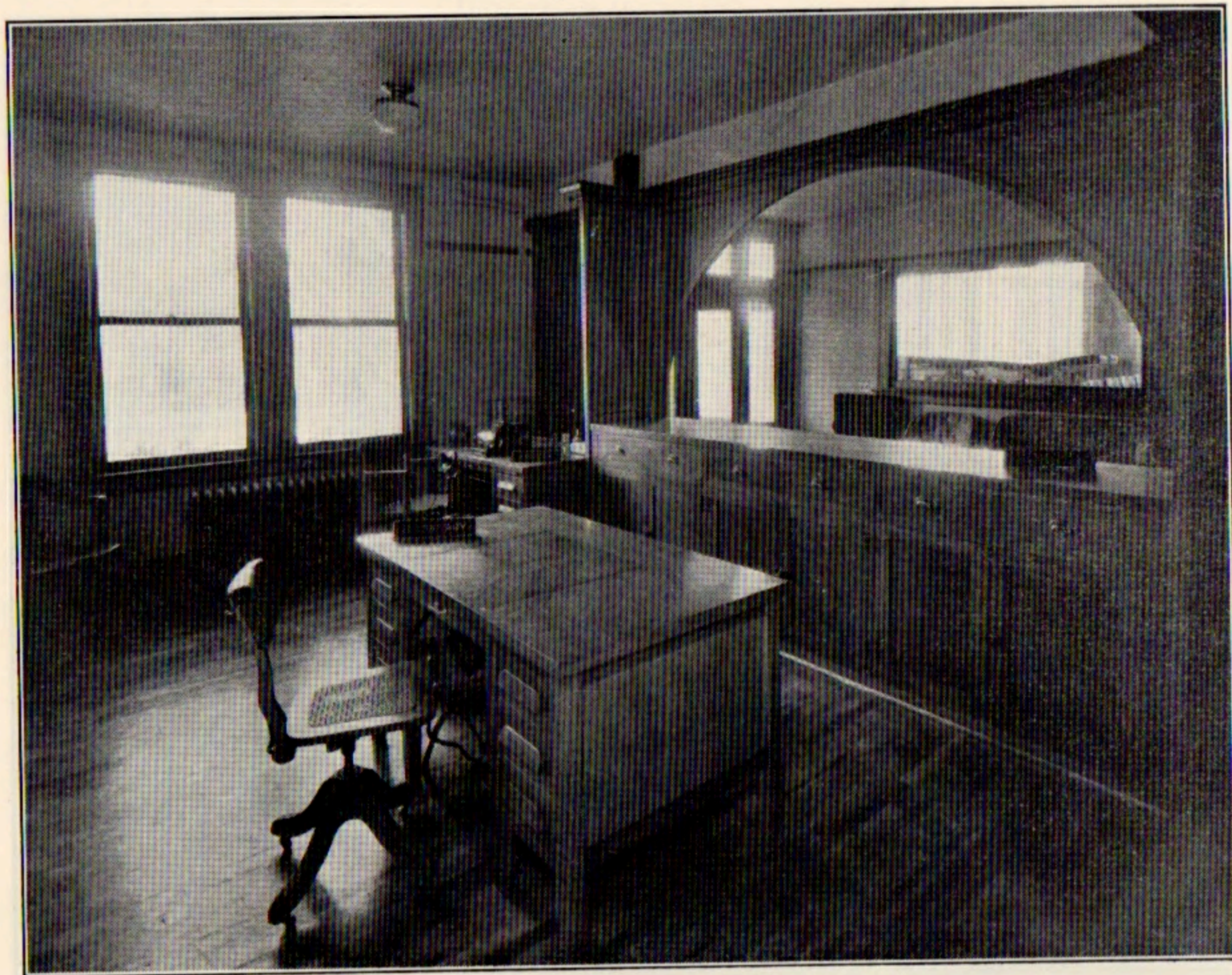
Entrance to the College



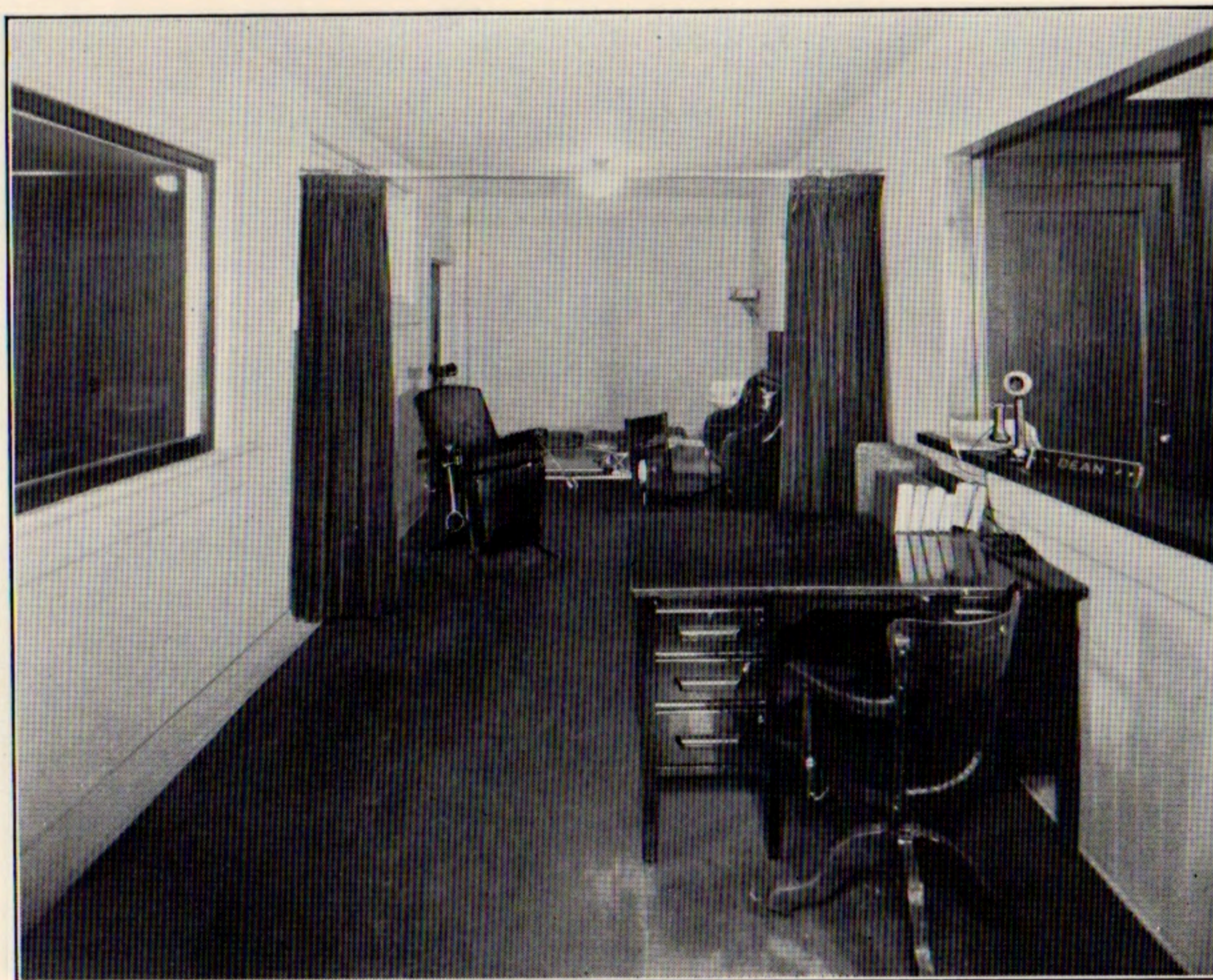

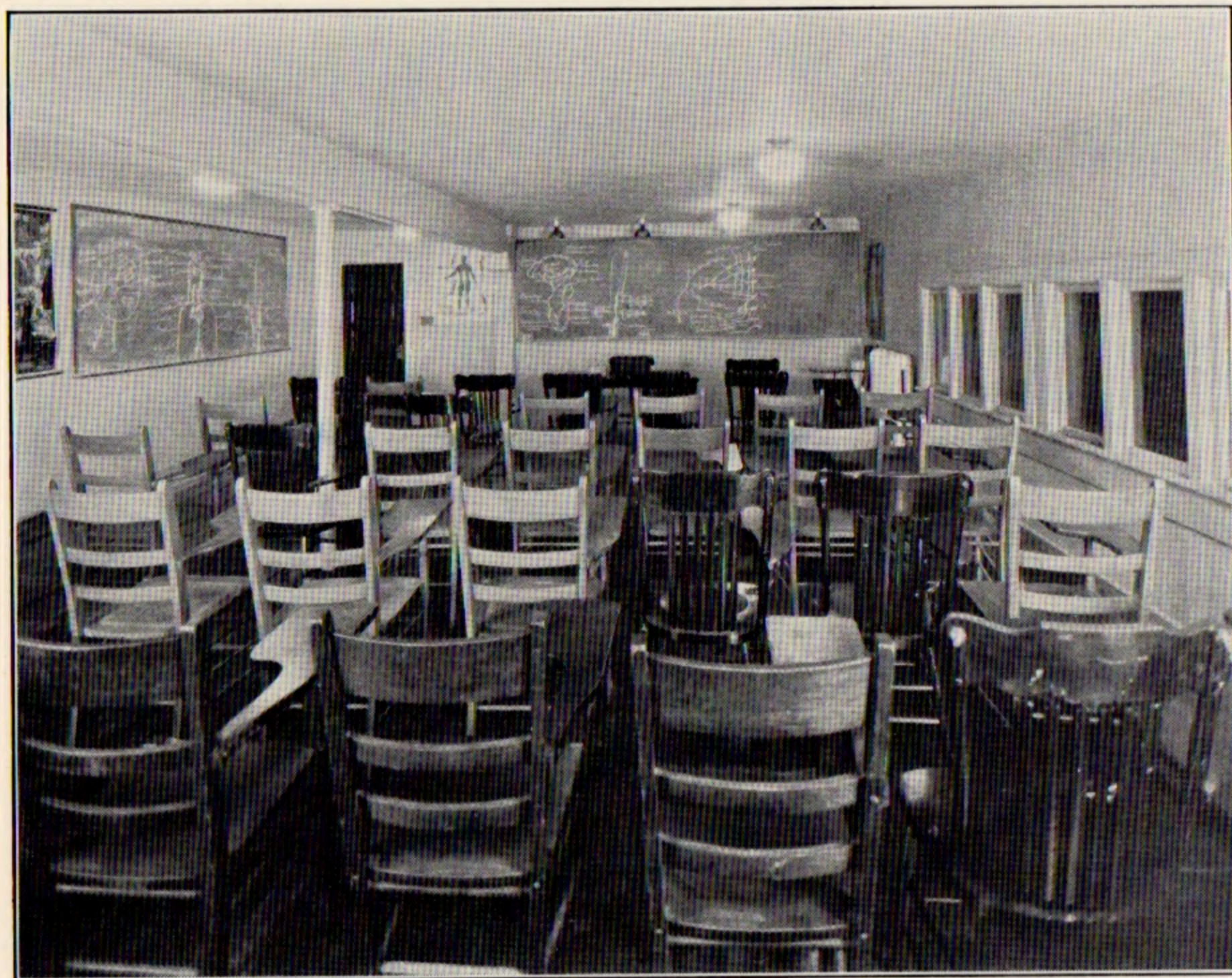

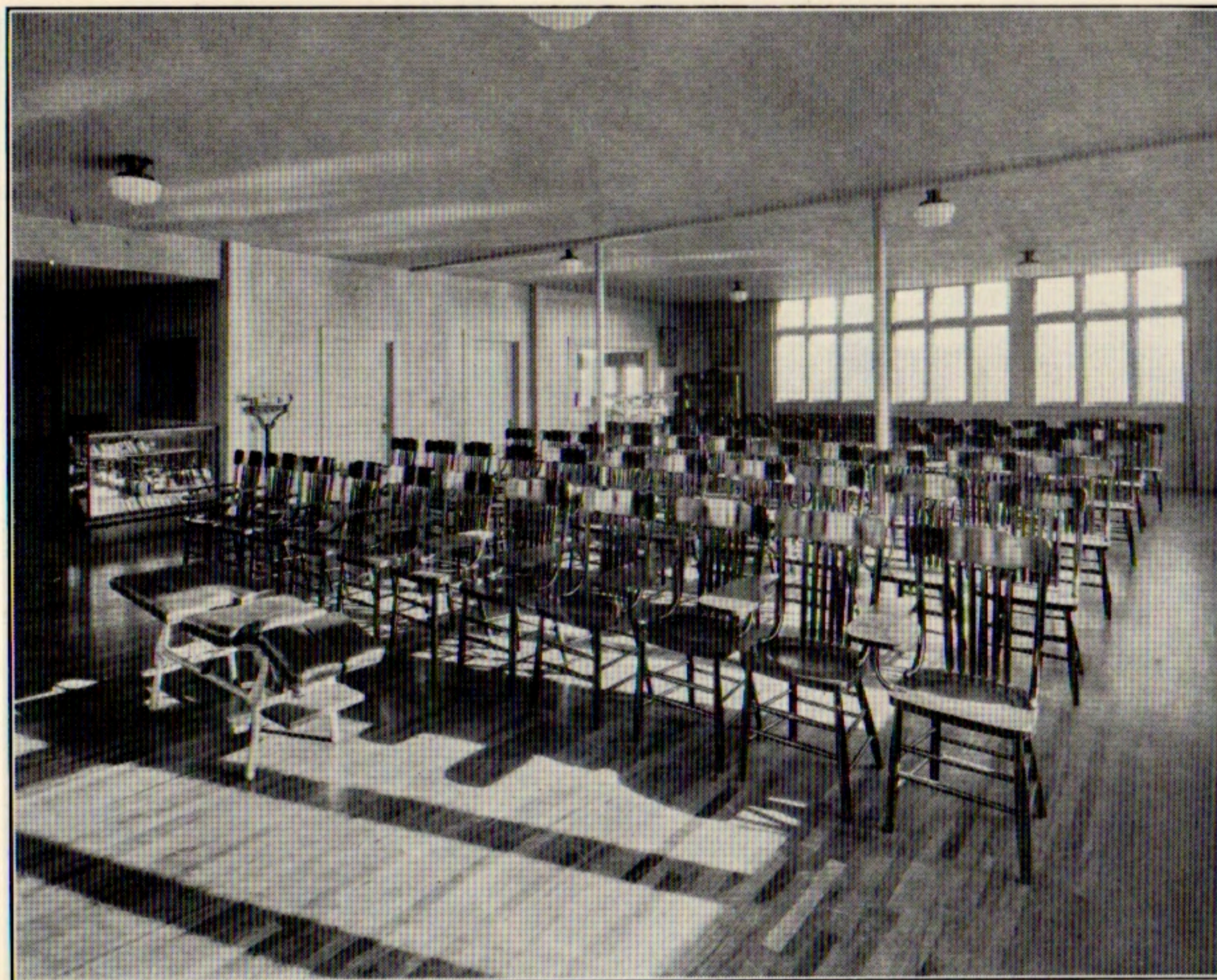

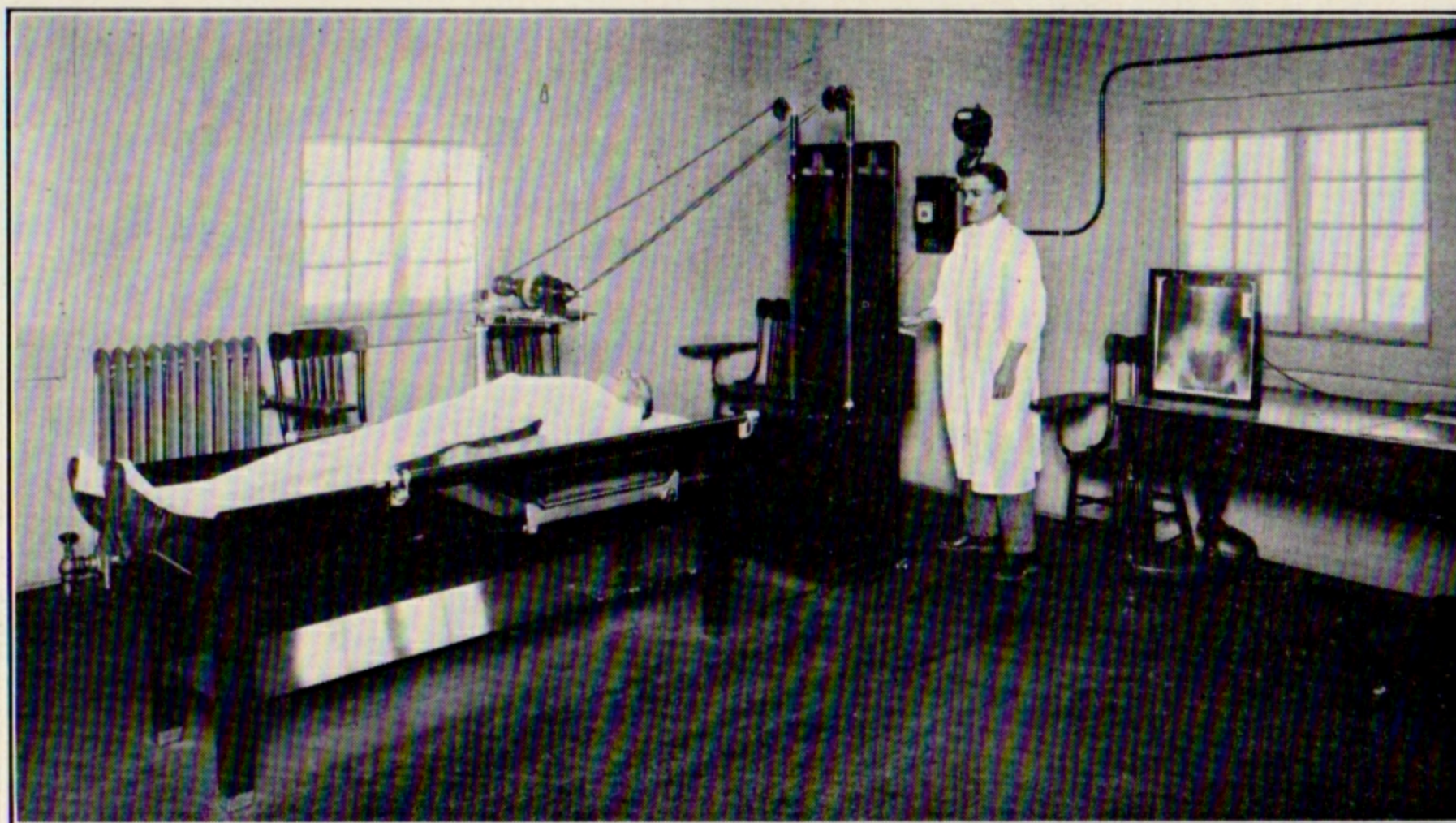

Our Course of Instruction

Anatomy

Anatomy is the keystone to Chiropractic. A thorough study of the human body is the first essential to success in the art and science of spinal adjustment. Our course covers the subject most thoroughly.

The study of the BONES, JOINTS, LIGAMENTS, MUSCLES, ARTERIES and VEINS.

The study of the Lymphatics, THE NERVOUS SYSTEM, THE THORACIC VISCERA, THE ABDOMINAL VISCERA and PELVIC VISCERA.

Special attention is paid to the Anatomy of the Spinal Column, the brain, the spinal nerves, the cranial nerves and the sympathetic system.

Physiology

Physiology deals with the function of each individual organ of the body. Thus, whereas anatomy deals with structures, this branch deals with the activities of the system and since the actions of the human body are controlled by the nerves, the nervous system is of the first importance to the Chiropractor and our instruction puts special stress upon its study. Our course deals with it under the following headings:

RESPIRATION, CIRCULATION OF THE BLOOD, DIGESTION, ABSORPTION, SECRETION AND EXCRETION, METABOLISM, INNERVATION, THE SPECIAL SENSES, THE REPRODUCTIVE ORGANS, ANIMAL HEAT.

Bacteriology

An understanding of the bearing which the lower forms of organisms, called Bacteria, have upon disease is essential to the Chiropractor. The subject is covered as follows:

Bacteria and Chiropractic, Classification of Bacteria, Disease and Bacteria.

Histology

The minute anatomy of BONES, CARTILAGE, MUSCLES and LIGAMENTS.

The minute anatomy of BLOOD VESSELS, LUNGS, HEART, STOMACH, INTESTINES, LIVER and SPLEEN.

The minute anatomy of PANCREAS, KIDNEYS, GENITO-URINARY ORGANS, SKIN and its APPENDAGES.

The minute anatomy of LYMPHATIC SYSTEM, BLOOD and NERVOUS SYSTEM.

Pathology

Pathology or the Anatomical Changes produced by disease.

INFLAMMATION, CONGESTION, GANGRENE, CHIROPRACTIC AND THE GERM THEORY, CLASSIFICATION OF BACTERIA OR GERMS, BACTERIA IN THEIR RELATION TO DISEASE. Description of the various forms of Tumors, Cancer, Sarcoma, Epithelioma, Adenoma, Non-Malignant Tumors, Cysts, their nature, Cause, Varieties and Treatment. The effects of Fever. How a Normal Body Temperature is maintained. The effect of Poisons on the Body Tissues.

Chemistry

Definition of Chemistry. The Various Kinds of Matter, Abbreviations or Symbols, the Metals and Non-Metals, Molecules, Atoms and Ions, Atomic Weight, Valence, Combinations and Changes of Matter, Elements, Compounds, Acids, Salts, Bases, Combinations of Elements to Form Compounds, Oxidation and Reduction, Law of Conservation of Matter, List of Reagents, Chemical Terms and Their Abbreviations, Equation, Urinalysis, Tests for Normal and Abnormal Chemical Constituents of the Urine.

Embryology

From the Embryology we learn how the human body is developed in the uterus. To the Chiropractor this knowledge is highly useful in that it enables him to understand inherited defects and their relation to disease in the child and adult. The following covers the subject:

The Vitelline Sac, Beginning of Circulation, The Primitive Heart, The Primitive Nervous System, The Fetal Circulation, Visceral Development, The Critical Period of Fetal Life, The Influence of Disease of the Mother upon the Fetus, Diseases of the Fetus, The Care of the New Born, Diseases of the New Born.

Gynecology

(DISEASES OF WOMEN)

Laws Relating to the Practice of Chiropractic in the State of Oregon, 1915

[Chapter 325, Laws of 1915, as amended by Chapter 410, Laws of 1919, Chapter 120, Laws of 1923, and Chapter 86, Laws of 1925.]

AN ACT AUTHORIZING and regulating the practice of Chiropractic in the State of Oregon; creating a State Board of Chiropractic Examiners, providing for appointment of the same; defining its powers and duties; to provide for the licensing and examination of Chiropractors in the State of Oregon; providing fees for the same; providing for the prosecution and penalties for the violation of this Act, and to repeal all Acts and parts of Acts in conflict therewith.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. That a board is hereby created and established to be known by the name of the "State Board of Chiropractic Examiners." Said board shall be composed of three Chiropractors who shall be residents of the State of Oregon and who shall have resided and practiced Chiropractic in said State for one year previous to the passage of this Act.

SECTION 2. The Governor of the State of Oregon shall within thirty days after the taking effect of this Act appoint three Chiropractors as specified in Section 1 of this Act, to constitute the members of this board. Said members shall be appointed so that the terms of office shall expire, one in a year, one in two years, and one in three years from date of appointment. Annually thereafter the Governor shall appoint one practitioner, to serve for a period of three years, and shall fill any vacancies on said board by death or otherwise.

SECTION 3. (a) Said board shall convene within thirty days after their appointment and organize by the election of a president, a vice-president and a secretary-treasurer from their membership.

(b) Said board shall have authority to administer oaths, take affidavits, summon witnesses and take testimony as to matters pertaining to their duties. They shall adopt a seal which shall be

affixed to all licenses issued by them and shall from time to time adopt such rules and regulations as they may deem proper and necessary for the performance of their work, and they shall adopt a schedule of minimum educational requirements, which shall be without prejudice or discrimination as to the different colleges teaching Chiropractic. The secretary of said board shall keep a record of the proceedings of the board which shall, at all times during business hours, be open to public inspection. Said board shall also keep on file with the Secretary of State a copy of their rules and regulations for public inspection, and shall elect annually their officers as provided herein. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum.

(c) A license to practice Chiropractic within the State shall be issued to the members of the board upon payment of the regular fees as provided herein.

(d) The board shall meet as the board of examiners on the first Tuesday following the second Monday of January and July of each year and at such times and places as may be found necessary for the performance of their duties.

SECTION 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to practice Chiropractic in this State unless he shall have first obtained a license as provided in this Act; provided, that nothing in this Act shall apply to or affect persons who are now actually in the practice of such profession, except as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 5. (a) Any person wishing the right to practice Chiropractic in this State shall make application to said Board of Chiropractic Examiners upon such form and in such manner as may be provided by the said board fifteen days prior to any meeting thereof. Each applicant shall be a graduate of a chartered Chiropractic School or College, which teaches a course of two years of nine months each or more.

(a) Examinations for license to practice Chiropractic shall be

made by said board according to the method deemed by it to be the most practical to test the applicant's qualifications. Each application shall be designated by a number, instead of the name, so that the identity will not be disclosed to the examiners until said papers are graded.

(b) All examinations shall be in writing, the subjects of which shall be as follows: Anatomy, physiology, pathology, gynecology, obstetrics, diagnosis, clinics, chiropractic theory and practice, as taught by chiropractic colleges. A license shall be granted to all applicants who shall correctly answer 75 per centum of all questions asked, and if any applicant fails to answer correctly 75 per centum of the questions on any branch of said examinations, he or she shall not be entitled to a license. The applicant, shall, however, be given credit for all branches passed.

(c) The schedule of minimum educational requirements to enable any person to practice chiropractic in the State of Oregon shall be as follows, to wit: Group 1, 120 hours; chemistry, 120 hours. Group 2, 745 hours; anatomy 610 hours and histology 135 hours. Group 3, 340 hours: toxicology 40 hours, minor surgery 40 hours and physiology 260 hours. Group 4, 425 hours: hygiene and sanitation 125 hours, pathology 300 hours. Group 5, diagnosis 500 hours. Group 6, 600 hours: chiropractic theory and practice 600 hours. Group 7, 300 hours: gynecology 105 hours and obstetrics 195 hours. Group 8, 170 hours: clinics 170 hours; making a total of 3,200 hours.

SECTION 7. All Chiropractors practicing within the State of Oregon one year prior to the passage of this Act and who shall present satisfactory evidence of having so practiced for such a time, and who shall show satisfactory evidence of having graduated from a chartered Chiropractic school or college whose requirements for graduation are not less than the requirements prescribed in subdivision (c) of Section 6 of this Act, shall be granted a license without examination upon the payment of a fee of \$10.00, provided that application be made within sixty days after the taking effect of this Act, and said application be accompanied with \$10.00 and with evidence of good moral character.

SECTION 8. (a) The State Board of Chiropractic Examiners may refuse to grant or may revoke a license to practice Chiropractic in this State or may cause a licentiate's name to be removed from all public records in the State upon any of the following grounds, to wit: The employment of fraud or deception in applying for a license or in passing an examination as provided in this Act; the

practice of Chiropractic under a false or assumed name; or the personation of another practitioner of like or different name; a conviction of a crime involving moral turpitude; habitual intemperance in the use of ardent spirits, narcotics or stimulants to such an extent as to incapacitate him or her from the performance of their professional duties. Any person who is a licentiate, or who is an applicant for license to practice Chiropractic against whom any of the foregoing grounds for revoking or refusing a license is presented to said board with a view of having the board revoke or refuse to grant a license, shall be furnished with a copy of the complaint, and shall have a hearing before said board in person or by attorney, and witnesses may be examined by said board respecting the guilt or innocence of said accused.

(b) Chiropractic is defined as that system of adjusting the articulations of the bony framework of the human body, especially asymmetries of the vertebrae, for the purpose of removing the cause of diseases by the correction of subluxations, thereby removing the pressure, impingement, or tension from the nerves having their passage between, through, or around the structures subluxated. The subluxation is corrected with the hands, using the bones of the body, more particularly the spinous and transverse process of the vertebrae, as levers to which is applied a peculiar adjustic movement—the Chiropractic thrust.

(c) Said board may at any time after two years of the refusal or revocation or cancellation of registration under this section, by a majority vote issue a new license or grant a license, to the person affected, restoring him to, or conferring on him all the rights and privileges of, and pertaining to the practice of Chiropractic as defined and regulated by this Act. Any person to whom such rights have been restored shall pay to the secretary-treasurer the sum of twenty-five dollars upon issuance of a new license.

SECTION 9. (a) Every person who shall receive a license from the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners shall have it recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county in which he resides and shall have it likewise recorded in the counties in which he shall subsequently move for the purpose of practicing Chiropractic.

(b) The failure or the refusal on the part of the holder of a license to have it recorded before he or she shall begin to practice Chiropractic in this State, after having been notified by the Board of Chiropractic Examiners to do so, shall be sufficient grounds to revoke or cancel a license and render it null and void.

SECTION 10. The county clerk of each county in this State shall keep for public inspection in a book provided for that purpose, a complete list and description of the licenses recorded by him. When any such licenses shall be presented to him for record he shall stamp upon the face thereof his signed memorandum of the date when such license was presented for record.

SECTION 11. (a) All examination fees received by the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners under this Act shall be paid to the secretary-treasurer of said board, who shall at the end of each year deposit the same with the State Treasurer, and the said State Treasurer shall place the said money as received in a special fund of the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners and shall pay the same out in warrants drawn by the Secretary of the State thereof, upon vouchers issued and signed by the president and the secretary-treasurer of said board. Said moneys so received and placed in said fund may be used by the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners in defraying their expenses in carrying out the provisions of this Act.

(b) The secretary-treasurer shall keep a true and accurate account of all funds received and all vouchers issued by the board; and on the first day of December of each year he shall file with the Governor of the State a report of all receipts and disbursements and the proceedings of the board for the fiscal year.

(c) The members of said board shall receive a per diem of ten dollars each day during which they shall actually be engaged in the discharge of their duties, and mileage at the rate of three cents per mile for each mile necessarily traveled in going to and from the meetings of said board.

(d) Such per diem and mileage and other incidental expenses necessarily connected with the said board shall be paid out of the fund of the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners and not otherwise.

SECTION 12. Chiropractic practitioners shall observe and be subject to all State and municipal regulations relating to the control of contagious [and] infectious diseases, sign death certificates and report any and all matters pertaining to public health, to the proper health officers the same as other practitioners.

SECTION 13. The treasurer of said board shall give bond in such sum and with such sureties as the board may deem proper. Upon sufficient proof to the Governor of the inability or misconduct of

a member of the board, said member shall be dismissed and the Governor shall appoint his successor from some licensed Chiropractor residing in the State.

SECTION 14. Persons licensed to practice Chiropractic under the laws of any other State having requirements of this Act may, in the discretion of the board, be issued a license to practice in this State without examination, upon payment of the fee of twenty-five dollars as herein provided.

SECTION 15. Any person who shall practice or attempt to practice Chiropractic, or any person who shall buy, sell or fraudulently obtain a diploma or license to practice Chiropractic, whether recorded or not, or who shall use the title "Chiropractic," "D.C.," "Chiropractor," "Chiropractic D. C.," or "Ph. C.," or any word or title to induce belief that he is engaged in the practice of Chiropractic, or who places upon any door a sign for the purpose of displaying any of the above mentioned titles, without first complying with the provisions of this Act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and the display of such titles or any of them fraudulently obtained shall be deemed prima facie evidence that such person is fraudulently engaged in the practice of Chiropractic, and subject to the regulations, convictions and penalties of this Act, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$200.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than thirty days nor more than one year, or both, the same being at the discretion of the court. All subsequent offenses shall be punished in like manner. Nothing in this Act shall be construed to interfere with any other method or science of healing in this State. [Sec. 1' Chap. 410, Laws of 1919.]

SECTION 16. It shall be the duty of the several prosecuting attorneys or district attorneys of the State of Oregon to prosecute all persons charged with violation of any of the provisions of this Act. The district court of Multnomah County and justice courts of the several counties of this State shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the circuit courts in the enforcement of this Act. It shall be the duty of the secretary-treasurer of the said board, under the direction of the said board, to aid said attorneys of the State in the enforcement of this Act. [Sec. 2, Chap. 410, Laws of 1919.]

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 8608, OREGON LAWS,
RELATING TO LICENSES OF CHIROPRACTORS.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. That Section 8608, Oregon Laws, be amended so as to read as follows:

SECTION 8608. *Unlawful to Practice Without License.*—It shall be unlawful for any person to practice Chiropractic in this State unless he shall have first obtained a license as provided in this Act; provided, that nothing in this Act shall apply to or affect persons who are now actually in the practice of such profession, except as herein after provided. Each person practicing Chiropractic within this State shall, on or before the first day of January of each year, after a license is issued to him as herein provided, pay to said Board of Chiropractic Examiners a renewal fee of two dollars (\$2.00). The secretary shall, on or before November 1 of

each year, mail to all licensed Chiropractors in this State a notice that the renewal fee will be due on or before the first day of January next following. This Act shall be construed to require the receipts to be recorded in like manner as original licenses. The failure, neglect or refusal of any person holding a license or certificate to practice under this Act in the State of Oregon to pay said annual fee of two dollars (\$2.00) during the time his or her license remains in force shall, after a period of sixty (60) days from the first day of January of each year, ipso facto, work a forfeiture of his or her license or certificate, and it shall not be restored, except upon the written application therefor and the payment to the said board of a fee of ten dollars (\$10.00), except that such licentiate who fails, refuses or neglects to pay such annual tax within a period of sixty (60) days after the first day of January of each year shall not be required to submit to an examination for the reissuance of such certificate. [Chap. 120, Laws of 1923.]
