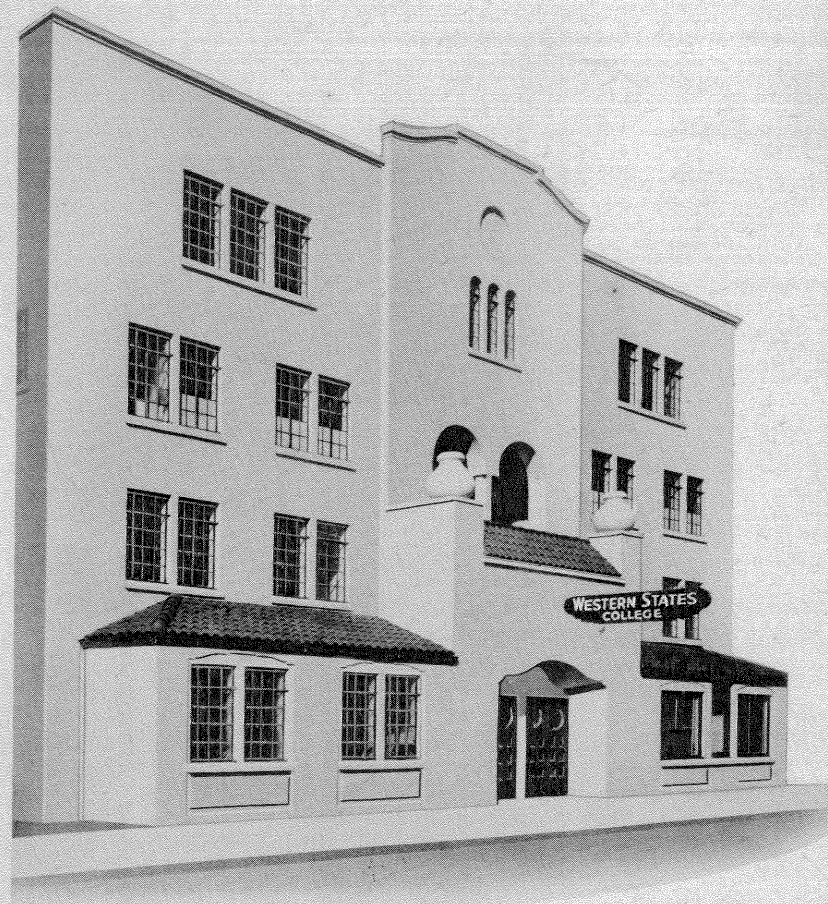

44th Commencement Exercises

At graduation exercises held in the College Auditorium, Thursday evening, March 27, 31 degrees of Doctor of Chiropractic and one degree of Doctor of Naturopathy were awarded to Western States College seniors. It was the forty-fourth Commencement since the school was founded.

The Commencement address was given by Alden F. Kreig, President of the Portland Junior Chamber of Commerce. The theme of Mr. Kreig's address was "Your Challenge Ahead," in which he brought out the responsibilities of a young professional man to his community, country, and profession. Western States College was commended for its constant improvement of requirements for the betterment of the Chiropractic profession and that the diploma is recognized throughout the world. "You are now on the final step of your challenge of putting your acquired knowledge to work before the public by establishing a practice and accepting the responsibilities of the profession," Mr. Kreig continued. In pointing out these responsibilities, the quotation "When you're green you grow; when you're ripe you rot" should be remembered, according to Kreig. "Each of you in this graduation class is in a position to bring health and hope to thousands of people during your professional career. There is no better public relations for a business or profession than personal service and each satisfied patient is a supporter of the profession that is supporting you, which you in turn should support."

Mr. Kreig then turned to the subject of responsibility of service to country, using at as his theme one of the prime objectives of the National Junior Chamber of Commerce, adoption of the "Hoover Report," and in this election year the need for all American citizens to get out and vote.

At the conclusion of his speech, Mr. Kreig said, "In summarizing your responsibilities of service to your profession, your fellow man and your country, we can say that — in practicing your profession by the high standards that have been set before you, you will be serving your fellow man, and by serving your country with use of your best American principles you will be serving both your profession and fellow man."

Chiropractic Technique

CORRECTING ROTATION OF KNEE WITH TIBIA OUTWARDLY ROTATED

POSITION OF PATIENT:

Supine, with thigh and knee flexed. In this position the lower leg should parallel the thigh. If the lower leg deviates to the medial this technic applies.

POSITION OF ADJUSTOR:

Facing patient at side of table, same side as leg to be adjusted.

CONTACT:

Grasp ankle with one hand while resting other hand on patient's knee to be used as a fulcrum.

DIRECTION OF THRUST:

Laterally with the fingers on the ankle. No thrust given on the knee.

DEPTH OF THRUST:

Limited, about one inch beyond tension point.

SPEED OF THRUST:

Spontaneous.
