O. A. C. P. AMENDS CONSTITUTION

At the special business meeting, held in conjunction with the Midwinter Symposium of the O A C P, two important amendments to the Constitution were adopted.

One amendment changes the time of the O A C P from "June and/or July" to November and/or December."

The other amendment merely changes the requirement of having the Executive Board meetings during a specific month during each quarter, to merely requiring that a Board meeting be held at least once each quarter, at a time and place designated by the President or the Board itself.

The reasoning back of the change in date of the Annual Convention was the fact that for the last few years our Conventions have been rather poorly attended, with the one last June reaching an all-time low. On the other hand, the Symposiums have been rather well attended, by comparison.

It was felt that by combining the Symposium and Convention, it would make for a better attendance, and greater participation by the membership in the affairs of the Association.

This will, however, create one problem. It will reduce the time allotted to educational work at the Convention by about 40% or more from what has usually been presented at the Symposium, if the business affairs of the Association are to be properly taken care of.

The suggestion has been made that the Convention session be extended for one day in order to maintain the educational factor as at present.

Another alternative has been suggested, that the educational sessions at the Convention be centered on a guest speaker from out of state, and that the Tri District Educational meetings be built up to provide a forum for the presentation of work from within the state.

With the acceptance of the Mid-Columbia District, by the Executive Board at its meeting during the Symposium, the O A C P now has nine Districts, so that it would now be possible to have three Tri-District Educational meetings without overlapping in conjunction with quarterly meetings of the Executive Board.

Along this line, the Executive Board has already awarded a Tri-District meeting to Eastern Oregon, under the sponsorship of Districts 7, 8, and 9, probably in June with the definite time and place to be set by the Districts involved.

ALUMNI NEWS

The first annual Western States College Alumni Breakfast was held at the Multnomah Hotel in Portland, Sunday, December 7th, with more than 50 members present.

Dr. Lawrence E. Rarey, the 1st President of the Association, addressed the group on the necessity of a powerful move to develop an even greater organization in the coming year and thanked those who had already joined with him in formulating the Association and carrying on the necessary development work.

Dr. Douglas L. Miller, Secretary-Treasurer, gave a brief review of the origin of the Association and activities of his office. He said that applications for membership are being received daily and stressed that all graduates of Pacific Chiropractic College, as well as those of Western States College are eligible for full membership, associate memberships are provided in the constitution and include all graduate chiropractic physicians, who are interested in Western State College. Dr. Miller also announced that through the efforts of Dr. Ed Gerstner, membership cards will be available in the very near future and as membership initiation fees and dues are received they will be mailed.

It was also announced that plans are underway to charter the Association and only those whose membership is established by that time will be included in the roster. If you have not sent in your application, send it to the secretary, Dr. Doug Miller, at the College immediately. If you have not received an application and are interested, write at once.

We would like to call the attention of all O.A.C.P. members throughout the state, to the change in convention date for next year, and also, outline the proposed tri-district and board meetings for '53.

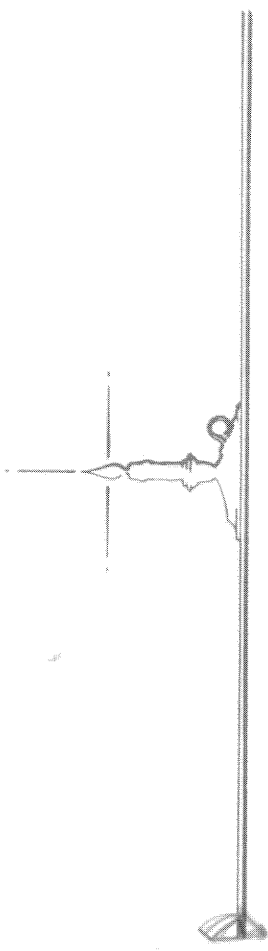

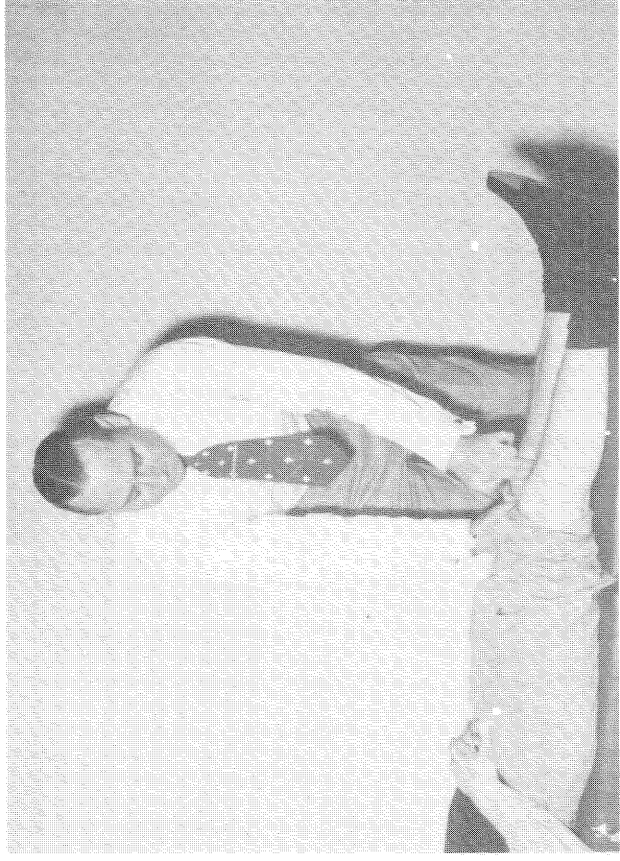

CHIROPRACTIC BOARD ANNOUNCES EXAM DATE

Dr. C. Clyde Dunham, Seaside, Oregon, Secretary of the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners, announced at the Midwinter Symposium that the dates set for the regular Winter meeting of the board will be January 8 and 9, 1953. He also pointed out that any person wishing the right to practice Chiropractic in Oregon shall make application to the board at least 15 days before the dates set.

Dr. Dunham also stated that the Chiropractic law provides that the board shall meet as board of examiners in January and July of each year.

The examinations are held in Room 720, State Office Building at 1400 S. W. 5th Avenue in Portland.

Other members of the board are: Dr. Forest I. Goddard, Salem, President, and Dr. Paul B. Firth, Portland, Vice-President.

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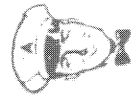
