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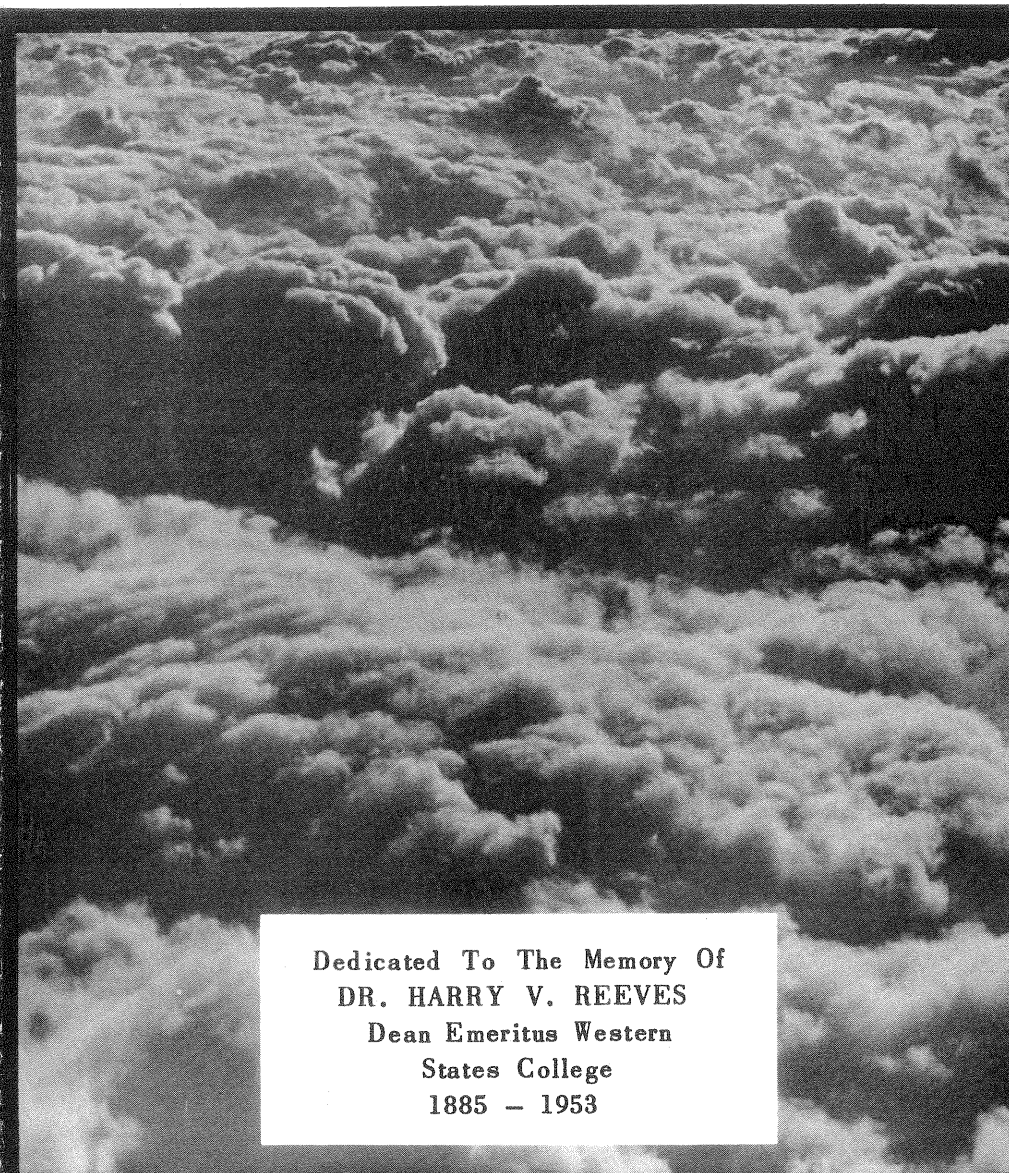

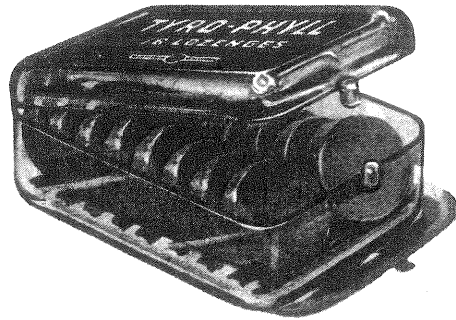

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LEGISLATION 1953

The following House Bills No. 272 and No. 268, and their companion bills No. 270 and No. 271 pertaining to Chiropractic and Naturopathy were first read on February 4, 1953 in the House of Representatives of the State of Oregon. These Bills were introduced by Representatives Dammasch and Jensen, by request of the Oregon Association of Chiropractic Physicians and the Oregon

Naturopathic Physician's Association. In essence Bills No. 268 and No. 270 will afford their respective State Boards of Examiners a qualified act relating to the suspension, revocation and denial of licenses. Bills No. 271 and No. 272 are concerned with raising the educational requirements for application to both Chiropractic and Naturopathic Boards of Examiners.

House Bill No. 272

A BILL

For an Act relating to the licensing of chiropractic physicians; amending section 54-322, O.C.L.A., as amended by section 2, chapter 62, Oregon Laws 1941.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. Section 54-322, O.C.L.A., as amended by section 2, chapter 62, Oregon Laws 1941, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 54-322 (a) Any person wishing the right to practice chiropractic in this state after the effective date of this Act shall make application to said board of chiropractic examiners upon such form and in such manner as may be provided by the said board 15 days prior to any meeting thereof. Each applicant must be a graduate of a standardized high school, or must present the equivalent of such education; which shall be certified by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction or a county school superintendent; (1) shall furnish the board with satisfactory affidavits of good moral character; (2) present to said board his or her diploma or satisfactory evidence of having graduated from a standardized high school accredited to the University of Oregon or any other university of equal standing, or a certificate signed by a state superintendent of public instruction or similar officer to the effect that such applicant has had scholastic preparation equivalent in all respects to that demanded for graduation from high school giving a four-year course of instruction in the state from which said certificate is issued; and also shall possess; (3) present a certificate of proficiency in the fundamental sciences issued to said applicant pursuant to section 54-108, O.C.L.A.; (4) present to the board satisfactory evidence that he or she has had at least two years satisfactory liberal arts and/or sciences study in a college or university accredited by either the Northwest Association of Secondary or Higher Schools or a like regional association or in a college or university in Oregon approved for granting degrees by the Oregon State Board of Education prior to matriculation into a chiropractic college; and in addition thereto shall be a graduate of an approved chiropractic school or college requiring; (5) present to the board his diploma or other satisfactory evidence of his graduation from a chiropractic school or college approved by said board, and in addition thereto said chiropractic school or college shall require for graduation a period of actual attendance [equivalent to not less than nine months for] of four years of at least nine months each with a schedule of minimum educational requirements enumerated in paragraph (c) of section 54-323, O.C.L.A., as amended by chapter 62, Oregon Laws 1941.

(b) There shall be paid to the secretary-treasurer of the state board of examiners by each applicant for a license a fee of \$25, \$10 of which shall accompany the application and the balance upon the issuance of the license. [Each application shall be accompanied with a certificate showing the good moral character of the applicant.]

(c) Any person who prior to October 31, 1953, has entered into a course of study in an approved chiropractic college which would have permitted him to take the examination under the provision of chapter 62, Oregon Laws 1941, shall be permitted to be examined for a license to practice chiropractic in the State of Oregon under the terms of chapter 62, Oregon Laws 1941, providing he shall make application therefor and shall pass said examination prior to March 1, 1958.

FORTY-SEVENTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY—REGULAR SESSION

House Bill No. 268

Introduced by Representatives DAMMASCH and JENSEN (by request of Oregon Naturopathic Physician's Ass'n) and read first time February 4, 1953

A BILL

For an Act relating to the authorization and regulation of the practice of naturopathy in the State of Oregon; amending section 54-531, O.C.L.A.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. Section 54-531 O.C.L.A. is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 54-531. The board may refuse to grant or may revoke a license to practice naturopathy in this state for any of the following reasons:

- (1) The use of fraud or deception in securing a license;
- (2) The impersonation of another physician;
- (3) Practicing naturopathy under an assumed name;
- (4) The procuring, aiding or abetting in procuring ~~an~~ abortion; provided, that for the purpose of this Act an abortion shall be deemed to mean the removal from the womb of a woman the product of conception at any time prior to delivery of the child; provided, further that nothing in this Act shall be construed to authorize any licensee under title 54, chapter 3, O.C.L.A., to perform an abortion;
- (5) The conviction of a crime involving moral turpitude;
- (6) Or for any other reason that shall render the applicant or licensee unfit to perform the duties of a naturopathic physician.

Within ten days after a refusal or a revocation of a license, the board shall furnish the applicant or licensee concerned with a detailed statement of the reasons for such refusal or revocation. Within 90 days from date of such refusal or revocation, the applicant or licensee shall have the right to appeal to the circuit court within the county where the board met, when license was refused, or in the county where the revoked license is recorded, for a reversal of the action of the board. The decision of the circuit court may be appealed to the Supreme Court of the state by either party to the action before such circuit court.

Listen Ladies

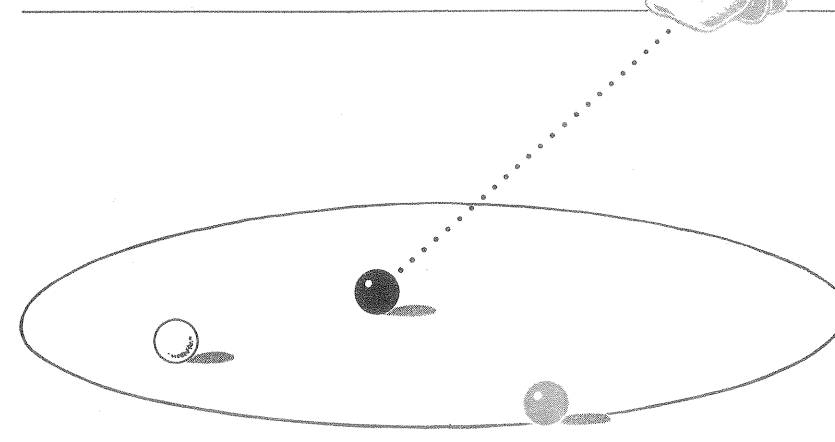

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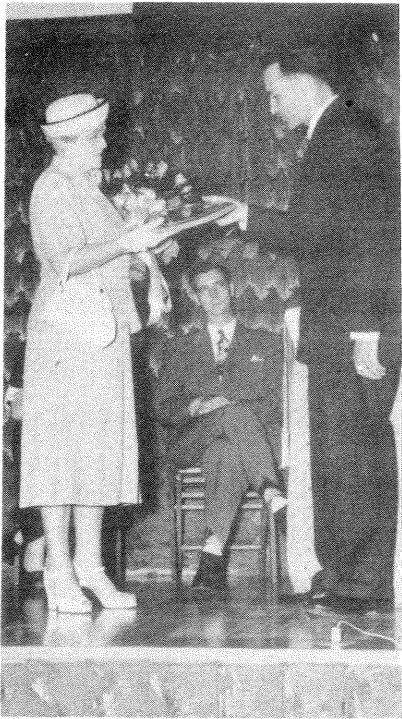
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Mrs. Harry V. Reeves & Student Body President Joe Boucher.

PRESENTATION OF PLAQUE BY PROXY

On Tuesday, July 29, of last year there was held the "Windup" Student Body Meeting of the year. One of the highlights of this meeting was the payment of tribute to a great man - great as a physician, great as a teacher. Unfortunately, due to an accident he met with just outside the college a few days before, this tribute was paid to him by proxy. The plaque pictured above was presented to Mrs. H.V. Reeves to honor her esteemed husband who was in transition from active Dean Emeritus of Western States College.

At precisely 10.45 A.M. that day, Student Body President Joe Boucher made the following presentation speech: "Webster's Dictionary defines the noun 'Politician' as meaning a statesman; and if we look up the meaning of the latter in the same dictionary, we find that it means a 'politician'. However, political science makes a fine distinction between

these two words. It defines 'Politician' as a man holding political office for the benefits he himself will derive therefrom - that is, salary, influence, prestige and so forth. On the other hand, a 'Statesman' denotes a man holding political office purely for the good he can do for the country.

Taking the title 'Statesman' then, in this light, - I would now like to pay tribute to a fine Statesman of the Chiropractic Profession. Time on our agendum today does not permit me to present the details of his life, suffice it to say that he chose to put aside the personal gain of private practice and instead, has and did sacrifice his life and career on the altar of education - and in so doing has made himself the target for more criticism than remuneration. He knew beforehand that this was the price and he was ready to pay. He, probably more so than anybody else, realized that the strength of the profession lies in the quality of her individual members, and as an educator did always strive to improve that quality.

The rays of the setting sun in his life's late afternoon are now casting their long shadows across his path, and it is during this twilight of his career that we, - his children - as he prefers to think of us - pause to pay him tribute.

On behalf of the Student Body of Western States College, of which I am proud to be president; The Faculty of Western States College; and the Oregon Association of Chiropractic Physicians, please accept for Doctor Reeves, this plaque as a small indication of the esteem in which the good Doctor is held by the college, the profession and all those who have known him."

Dr. Reeves originally held interest in the field of medicine, but finding this unsatisfactory he decided to change to Osteopathy, that too was unable to satisfy his interest in the healing arts. Still seeking to find a hidden something to fill his uneasiness he at last focused his interest on Chiropractic. This gave him great satisfaction and to the field of Chiropractic he devoted all of his efforts and thus contributed enormously to this branch of the healing arts.

Dr. Reeves began his career as an instructor in Chiropractic technique at The National College of Chiropractic, which he held for many years. He contributed largely to establishing the theory of reflex subluxations which solved many difficulties and problems confronting the teachers at that time. This contributed greatly to those who were asking to elaborate and perfect a philosophy worthy of the name. Dr. Reeves was also active in developing the theory and practice of physiotherapy from the Chiropractic viewpoint. He worked with A.L. Forster M.D. D.C. along this line. He was well liked and exceedingly popular with the students

and faculty during this work.

In Chicago, he was associated with Dr. McManis, and had much to do with the design and production of the McManis table.

Dr. Reeves held a keen interest in social groups. He spent much of his non-school time in the Masonic Lodge in which he held membership for twenty years. He also was a member of the Elks for thirty years. He played an important part in establishing Sigma Phi Kappa Fraternity. In this organization he acted in the capacity of Grand Chancellor and Grand Chaplain. His keen interest in this fraternity led to the establishment of Sigma Phi Kappa in schools throughout the country.

The good doctor left National College of Chiropractic and went to Billings, Montana to practice, and there became President of the Board. He was located here approximately eight years, associated mostly with Dr. Lewis F. Downs. It was here in Billings that Dr. Reeves met the comely lass from Freement, Indiana, whom he wooed and won. The next stop for Mr. and Mrs. Reeves was Douglas, Wyoming. In this town, fate intervened in their lives. Dr. Budden and Dr. Reeves met very unexpectedly in a small cafe. The two men had lost track of each other in Chicago many years before. Neither knew the other was in this town. Dr. Budden turned his salesmanship personality in Dr. Reeves' direction and the result was that the Director of W.S.C. acquired a first class Dean for his college, located in Portland, Oregon.

The ensuing twelve years saw Dr. Reeves laboring unceasingly for the good of the profession and the school, taking very little time out to pursue the piscatorial art of which he was devoted on the banks of Oregon's many fine streams.

A surprise to all of us was the discovery that Dr. Reeves "secret" hobby was woodworking. He had an elaborately equipped hobby shop, which would turn many a professional green with envy. Their home and the homes of his friends gave ample evidence of the Doctor's dexterity along this line.

The city has lost a great citizen, the profession has lost a good friend, and the school misses a great benefactor and teacher.

The next meeting will be February 19th. at the school.

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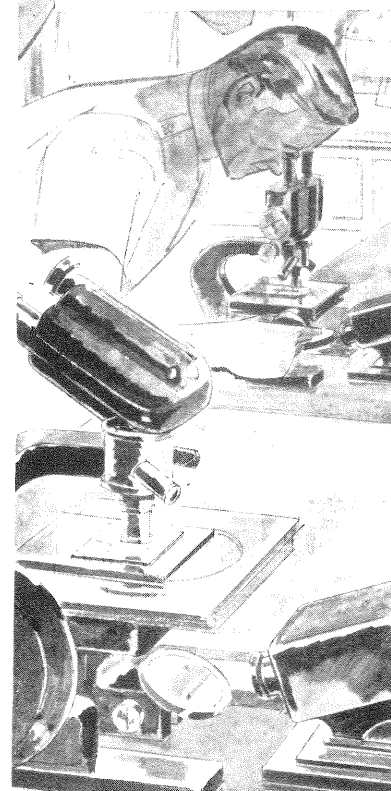
