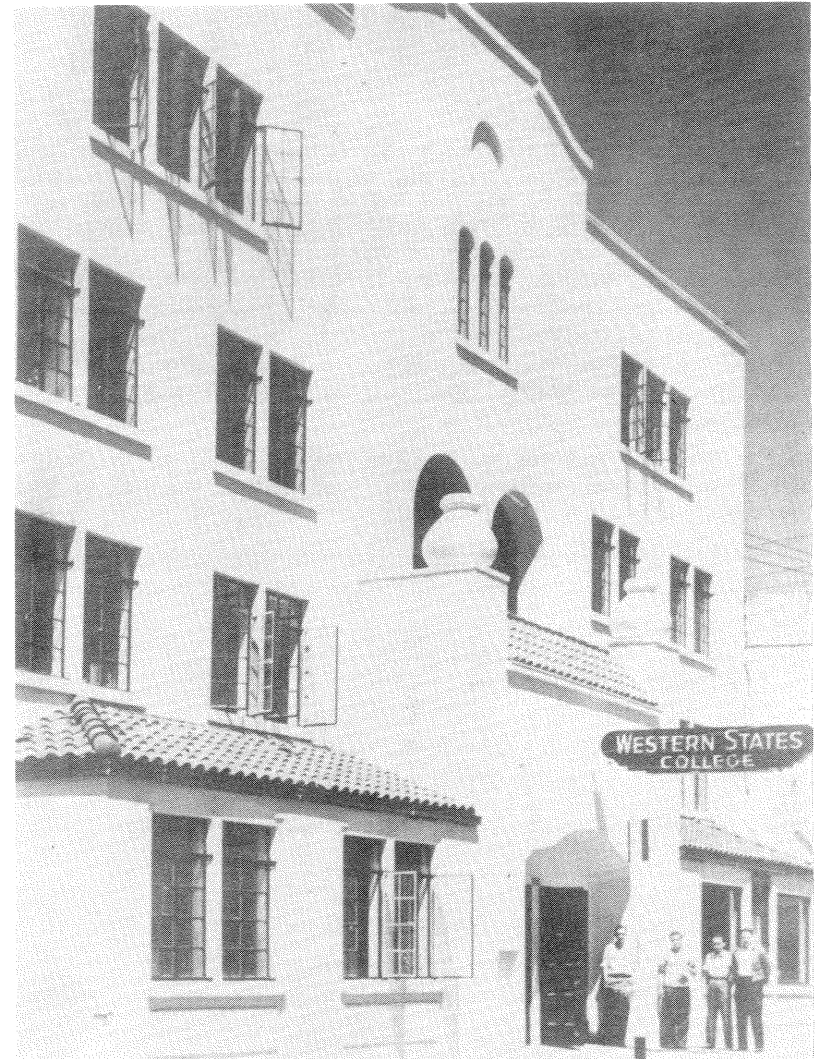

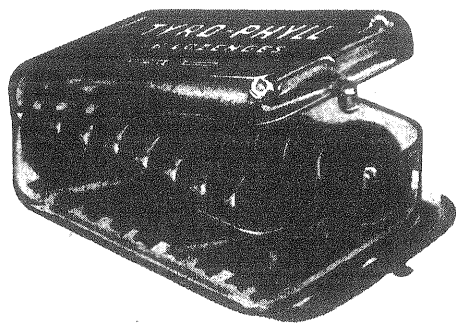

**EDITORIAL**

Of greatest interest to our profession is the higher scholastic standards which will be required of new students attending W.S.C. this Fall. A high school diploma will no longer be adequate to start college, but an additional two years of college must be successfully completed.

House Bill No. 271 for the Naturopaths and House Bill No. 272 for the Chiropractors requires that two years of liberal arts or science study from a college acceptable to the Northwest Association of Secondary & Higher Schools affiliated with the National Association of Accreditation Secondary and Higher Schools be completed.

This will not apply to students already attending Chiropractic College as they will come under the Grandfather's clause which allows them to continue as they are now.

60 semester hours or ninety quarter hours are the set requirements to be considered at W.S.C. The exact required subjects have not yet been definitely decided upon for pre-chiropractic but the following are strongly recommended and suggested -- Inorganic Chemistry, Organic Chemistry, Biologic Sciences, Physics,

English, Psychology, Physical Ed, Electives such as Anatomy, Public Speaking, Mathematics, Philosophy, U.S. History, Political Science, Foreign Language, Sociology.

It will be of interest to you to know that a National Chiropractic Association vocational guidance booklet called "Chiropractic - A Career" will be placed in all Colleges and Universities west of Chicago, The purpose of this manual is to counsel those whose desires and aptitude qualify them for entrance into one of the professions devoted to health maintenance and to prepare a pre-chiropractic program for those who have chosen Chiropractic as a career. This will bring Chiropractic to the attention of many college students who may not have realized its value to public needs today.

This is what we have been looking forward to, so let's give it our hearty approval and support.

two hundred men. This he did without the advantage of the fine points extra credit allowed to veterans. We learned that he now has his assignment. Copper Jake.


Distinguished people item:

May 1st is not far away! The time to act is now! Furnish your readers with enough of the right information so to make them well aware of this program of good posture in the interest of their health

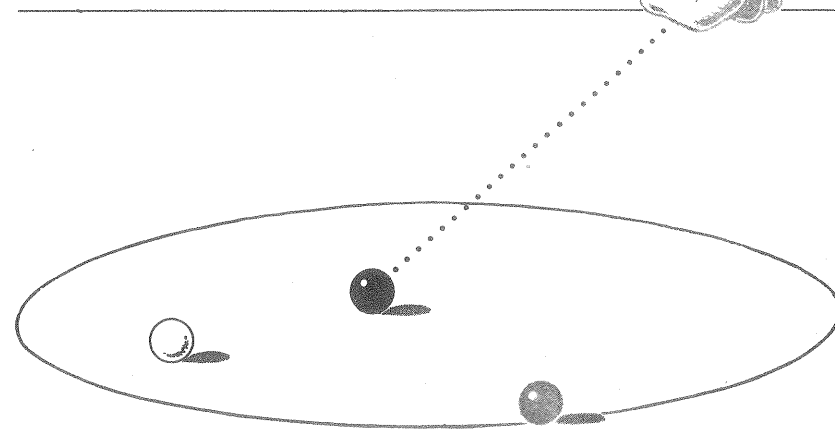
## LISTEN LADIES

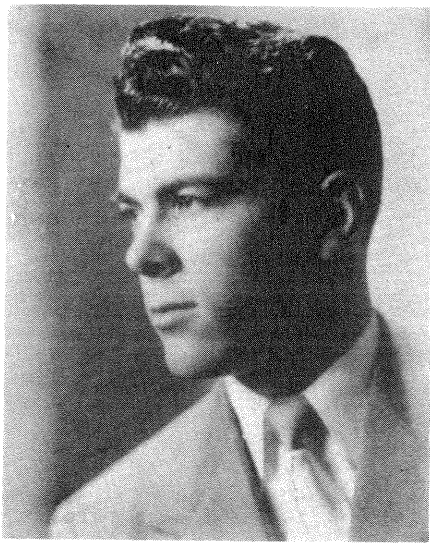

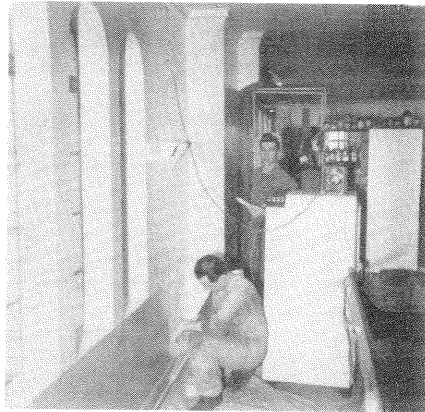

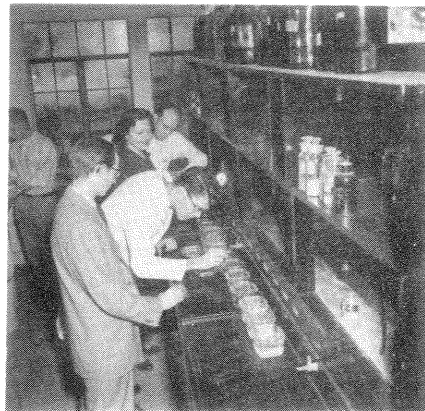
When the position of lab director became vacant, Charles, with his background training and varied practical experience, was placed in charge of W.S.C. laboratory.

FCC EXPECTS DIATHERMY USERS  
TO COMPLY WITH RULES PART 18  
BY JUNE 30, 1953

The Commission on June 25, 1952 adopted a Report and Order amending Section 18.51 of the Rules and Regulations Relating to Industrial, Scientific, and Medical Service to extend until June 30, 1953 the applicable date of Part 18 to medical diathermy equipment manufactured prior to July 1, 1947.

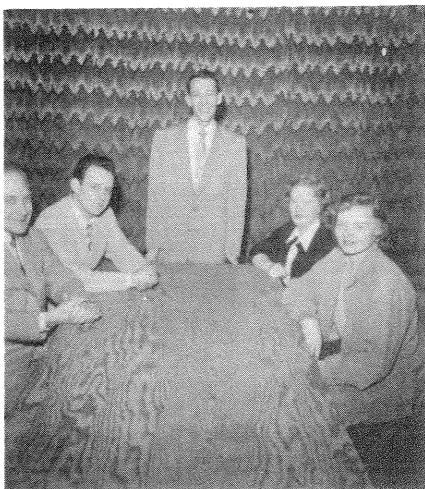
This extension appeared necessary because of the unavailability of conforming equipment to replace those machines manufactured prior to July 1, 1947, which could not be operated in accordance with the requirements of the rules.

In that Report and Order the Commission advised all interested parties that further requests for extension of the applicability date were sought, such requests would be considered on an individual basis, taking into consideration the efforts made by the users of non-conforming equipment to replace it during the period for which the extension was granted.

The Commission continues to receive reports of interference caused by the operation of medical diathermy equipment. With few exceptions, the equipment responsible for the interference is equipment which was manufactured prior to July 1, 1947, and which does not comply with the requirements of Part 18, particularly with respect to the suppression of emissions outside the frequency bands allocated for medical diathermy equipment.

Information available to the Commission indicates that type approved diathermy equipment is now available for early delivery. Accordingly, all interested persons are advised that the Commission has no present intention of adopting any further general extension of the time for compliance with the applicable portions of Part 18 of the rules beyond June 30, 1953.

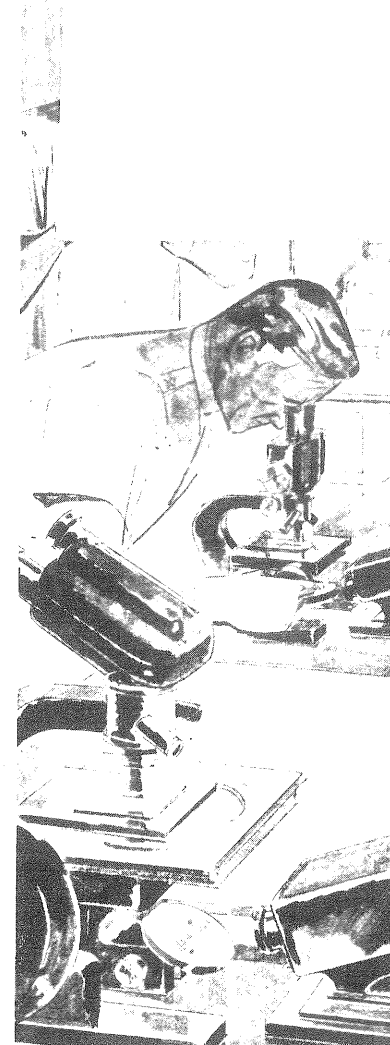
