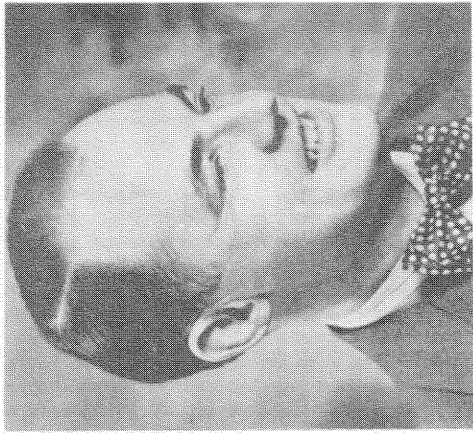

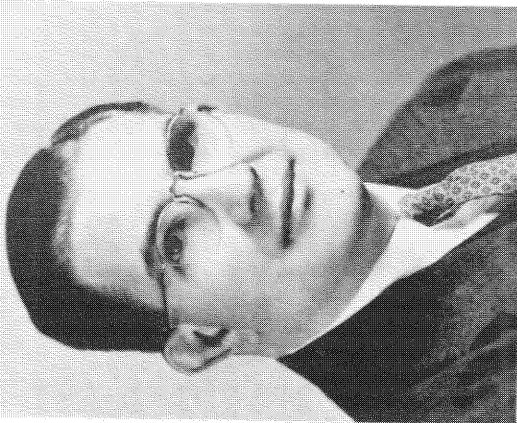
**SYMPOSIUM LECTURER**

The O.A.C.P. Winter Symposium has as guest lecturer, Dr. A. L. Schultz, Mitchell, South Dakota, Chiropractic Physician who has gained much reknown with his hobby of devising supports, braces, and taping methods for athletic injuries.

Dr. Schultz has always been active in sports and his love, especially for baseball, has gained for him a considerable reputation both as a player and manager of teams.

He was graduated from Lincoln College of Chiropractic in 1930, taught Kinesiology at Dakota Wesleyan University for 2 years, and has cared for the Athletes of that school for 22 years. In 1951, he wrote the book, "Athletic and Industrial Injuries of the Knee", the first of a series on athletic conditions.

He was president of the South Dakota Chiropractors Association from 1948 to 1950, has served on the Board of Directors and Legislative Committee since 1941. He has been a member of the Technique Committee of the National Chiropractic Association since 1951.



The Symposium Luncheon, to be held in the Empire Room of the Mulmonah Hotel, December 6th, will find S. Eugene Allen, State Senator-elect, Thirteenth District, from Portland, as the guest speaker. 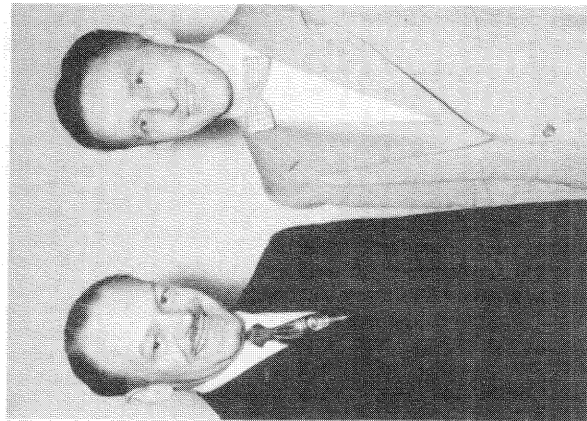

**NEWS AND VIEWS**

To most of us the Physiotherapy Conference that was held at Western States College during the week of August 18 to 23, is old news. Many of the techniques demonstrated in the use of the various electrical modalities were not new either, but those that were old, were time tested and the best of therapy, so that we who attended had the opportunity to make notes on information of real value.

The conference itself was the first annual event of its kind, and it was proposed that the National Physiotherapy Council conduct a similar educational session each year. Many bids have been received from points throughout the nation, for the privilege of being host for the conference to be held next year.

Commendations should be extended to Drs. M.L. Higgins, P.L. Paulson and W.J. Gallagher for arranging and conducting a punctual and enlightening program. Time was not wasted, as each speaker carried with him information that held the interest of everyone present. Then too, the moderators "kept the ball rolling" by keeping succeeding events on time and not allowing any lull in their program.

Dr. M.L. Higgins lead the discussion on the value and use of galvanic currents. Space prohibits elaboration on the polarity activity of the positive and negative currents, but he emphasized that the basic purpose of the galvanic current is chemical. Also that the use of supportive therapy is taken for granted, and except for the use of sine wave, which in many instances is incorporated in the same modality, other therapies will not be considered in our review of notes on treatment of the following conditions.  
Brachial Neuritis: Find the motor point of

the painful area with a small electrode using sine wave. Use constant sine to the point of patients tolerance and fatigueability of the muscle. Follow with use of super-imposed positive galvanic current over the motor point of the same muscle. The positive pad should be comparatively small, placing the large dispersal (negative) pad on the patients back. Treat to patients skin tolerance for 10 to 15 minutes. Caution should be exercised until experience justifies the intensity and duration of current used. The treatment may also include placing the positive pad over the brachial nerve roots involved. A straight positive current may be used, but when available the superimposed (sine plus galvanic) current seems more effective.

On "frozen" shoulders use straight positive galvanic to brachial nerve roots. Follow with superimposed galvanic wave to infra-spinatous muscle.

In sciaticas that radiate into the acetabulum: Place large negative pad, or pads if you have a bifurcated cord, on patients back. (One may be placed on the thigh.) Positive electrode is placed over a motor point just above the greater trochanter. Use current tolerance as indicated above.

In treatment of painful knee joint: Have patient supine on table with knee slightly flexed. Strap positive pad over the area of the joint that is tender. With use of bifurcated cord, place two negative pads on the opposite sides of the leg, one above the one below the knee. Again the use of the superimposed galvanic current seems to be most effective. Caution: Care must be practiced in treating a boney area such as the knee, to prevent a burn.

Your editor has found the following treatment simple and helpful in treating sinusitis and in inflammations of the nose and throat: With patient lying supine, place a 3"x3" positive pad over the forehead, and a 5"x7" or larger dispersal pad on the chest. Treat to patients tolerance (usually 1 1/2 to 3 M.A.) for 15 minutes. Very often 4 to 6 treatments are quite effective.

Upon being appointed editor of The O.A.C.P. news by our association president, a request was made to the district secretaries for them to provide information of interest from their region of the state. An immediate response was received from districts No. 3 and No. 8.

Dr. Victor Myers of Stayton report: District No. 3 extends an invitation to all O.A.C.P. members to attend their annual Christmas party at Newberg on December 13th. Those attending are asked to bring a gift, the cost of which is to be limited to \$1.00, and marked only with the words—MAN or WOMAN.

Dr. R.D. Ketchum of Bend wrote: District No. 8 met in Burns on Saturday evening November 10th with Drs. Wayne and Geneva Nelson. The meeting was attended also by Drs. Carl E. Stewart and M.M. Pendroy of Redmond, R.D. Ketchum of Bend and their wives. Following dinner, a combined business and social evening was enjoyed by the four couples.

The next meeting is to be held in Prineville with Dr. and Mrs. Harold Matz acting as hosts.

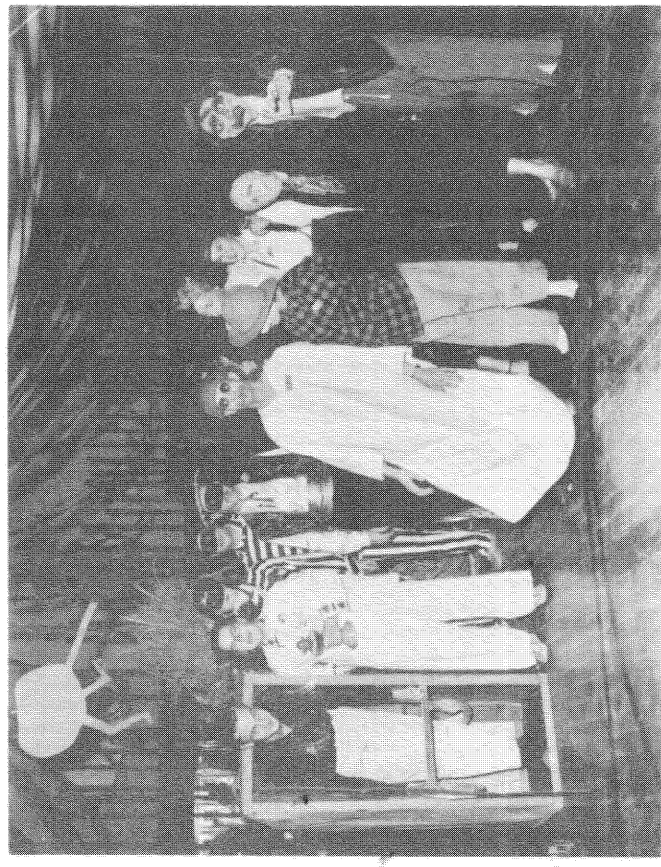

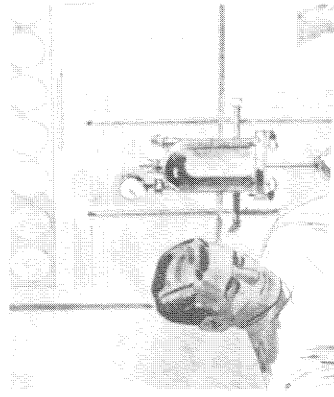

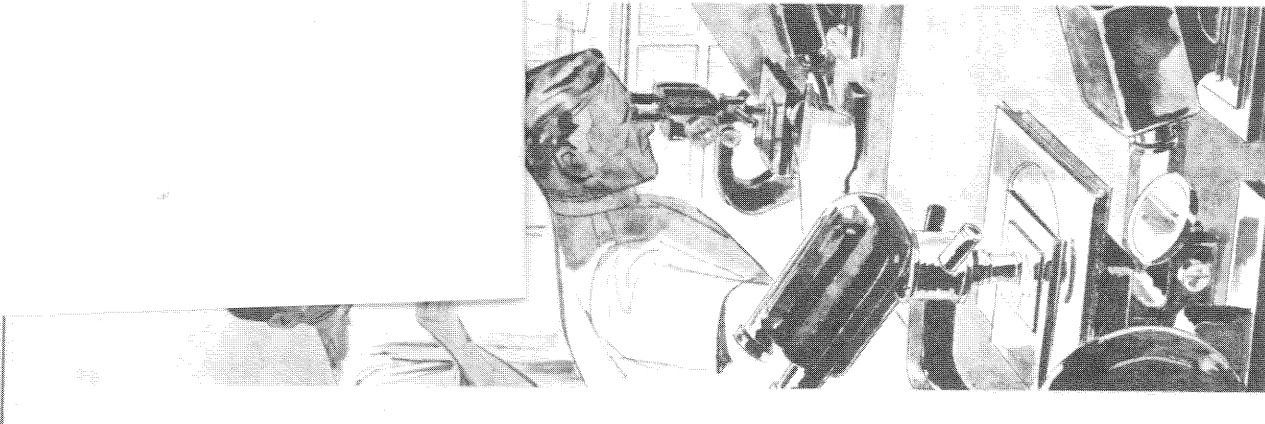
