

Herbert J. Vear, D.C., F.C.C.S., joined the Administration of Western States Chiropractic College on August 15th as Academic Dean. He fills a position that has been vacant since January 1977.

Dr. Vear is a graduate of Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College and has taken Post Graduate work at the Banting Institute, University of Toronto.

In 1969 Dr. Vear left private practice to accept the position of Dean at Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College. He served in this capacity until his resignation in 1976 at which time he was elected Dean Emeritus by the C.M.C.C. Board, but continued his association with the college as Dean of Post Graduate, a post which he held until coming to W.S.C.C.

Along with his college responsibilities, Dr. Vear continued in part-time private practice in Toronto which he closed when he accepted the position at Western States Chiropractic College.

Dr. Vear is well known in Chiropractic circles in the U.S.A. and Canada. He has served as guest lecturer at a number of state conventions and seminars. He has also published papers in several journals, including the Journal of the American Chiropractic Association.

Among his other interests Dr. Vear is a pilot, collects aviation memorabilia and enjoys reading and music. He served in the Royal Canadian Air Force as a navigator from December 1942 to August 1945. He retired from the R.C.A.F. Reserve as a Major in 1968.

Student Awards Assembly

A new facet of Chiropractic education was developed in Albuquerque as the Council on Chiropractic Education held their semi-annual meeting. It was decided that the presidents could benefit from close cooperation through an organization.

Stemming from this, the group voted to form the Association of Chiropractic College Presidents. The purpose of the Association will be to discuss common problems and to encourage cooperative programs, including research.

Elected to a two-year term as President of the Association was W.S.C.C.'s President Timmins. Selected as Secretary-Treasurer for a two-year term was Dr. W. Heath Quigley, president of Los Angeles College of Chiropractic.

New Business Manager

On November 1, 1977 Jack Van Horn of Illinois College, Jacksonville, Illinois will join the staff of Western States Chiropractic College as Business Manager. Mr. Van Horn has been Business Manager at Illinois for the past 10 years.

During Mr. Van Horn's term of office at Illinois they have operated on a balanced budget and finished the 1975-76 year with a surplus.

Mr. Van Horn will be filling a vacancy which has existed at W.S.C.C. since January of this year. Dr. David MacFadden, Dean of Administration has been handling the business affairs of the College.

Obituaries

Dr. Martha Holland Lowe

Dr. Martha Holland Lowe, a pioneer resident of Seaside and a pioneer chiropractor, died Oct. 3 in a rest home in Anacortes, Wash., at age 107.

Dr. Lowe was born May 21, 1870, in Norway, and came to the United States at age 14 on a sailboat with her father, Jasper Holland. They settled in Hanford, Minn., where her father homesteaded. She taught school there in her late teens, and was the first woman to ride a bicycle to the school house. Dr. Lowe relocated in Joliet, Mont., where she taught school until she met her husband, Jacob Jake Lowe. They homesteaded in that area and she raised their five children: Fred Lowe, Paul Lowe, Amelia Lowe, John Lowe and Jasper Lowe. All survive except for Fred who died about seven years ago.

In 1916, she moved from Montana to Portland and attended Western States Chiropractic College. Following graduation she located in Seaside in 1918. She practiced her profession locally and continued to raise the family.

She moved to Astoria shortly after the Astoria Fire in 1923, and continued her practice there until about 1945. She returned to Seaside and had a home constructed on Tillamook Head.

Funeral services are pending. However, her son, Dr. Jasper W. Lowe, a retired chiropractor, said the body will be interred at Ocean View Cemetery.

Funds Received from Springwall

A check for \$3,500.00 was recently received from the Springwall Education and Research Trust via F.C.E.R.

The grant was a part of a matching gift program requiring the College to raise an additional \$3,500.00. The matching funds were raised from memorials and other gifts donated by the profession.

Research equipment has been purchased with the \$7,000.00 received from this effort.

Miscellaneous

217th and Stark Street

A sale of the property at 217th and Stark Street in Gresham, Oregon has been completed and the funds received have been used to cancel a loan that made the purchase of the new clinic possible.

The buyer of this property was the Gresham Church of the Nazarene. The College property adjoined the Church.

Computer Service

W.S.C.C. has now gone computer. The first computer program was in the payroll department. Next all accounts receivable statements at the clinic will be made out by computer. American Data Service will provide the service. These two programs will save many hours of time in the bookkeeping department.

The Registrar's office has also employed American Data Service to help with class lists, class schedules and make transcript labels.

Additional computer help is planned in the Business Office in the area of Profit and Loss statements and encumbrance bookkeeping statements.

Western States Chiropractic College was host to two distinguished visitors in September — one from Australia and the other from Japan.

Arriving early in September was Dr. J.B. Ritchie who is principal of the Preston Institute of Technology in Bundooora. The Institute is the home of Australia's International College of Chiropractic. The purpose of Dr. Ritchie's visit to North America includes on-site viewing of the Western States campus and talks with staff and faculty. While in the U.S., Dr. Ritchie is also conferring with other leaders in chiropractic.

Last fall the campus was visited by Dr. Edwin Webb who represented the Australian government in a study of chiropractic in North America and Europe. Australia is currently studying the chiropractic profession regarding registration (licensure) of practitioners and chiropractic educational programs.

The visitor from Japan was Dr. Harry Nishihata who is President of the Institute of Oriental Medicine in Osaka. His tour of W.S.C.C. was the result of a growing interest in chiropractic in Japan. There are currently about 45 practitioners there, but they are not recognized by the government at present.


Dr. J. Clay Thompson receiving a plaque for "Outstanding Service to the Chiropractic Profession" from Dr. Timmins.
