

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## SCHOOL OF NATUROPATHY GRADUATES EIGHTEEN



In 1928 Dr. Reeves, due to the lure of the West and trout fishing, moved to Montana where he practiced until 1937. He served as President of the Montana State Chiropractic Association in 1925. In 1937 he moved to Wyoming where he practiced until 1940 at which time he again moved coming to Portland. He has been associated with Western States College since 1950, rejoining Dr. Budden at that time.

Dr. Reeves has spent the greater part of his Chiropractic career in teaching; has been a lecturer and teacher of technique since 1921. He is one of the advocates of the subluxation theory of abnormal stimulation to a terminal nerve, which could arise within the vertebral foramen or along the course of a spinal or visceral nerve. He met with much opposition in the early days because the theory of a "pinched nerve" was advocated by most.

Dr. Reeves has given much to Chiropractic. His advances of Chiropractic philosophy, based on sound physiological reasoning, has aided the advance of this art and science to its present day high level.

## DR. HARRY V. REEVES


Our front cover this month is Dr. Harry V. Reeves, Dean of Western States College. Dr. Reeves teaches Adjustive Technic and Visceral Neurology as a member of the faculty.

Dr. Reeves has long been in the field of Chiropractic. Before he received his Chiropractic degree from the National College of Chiropractic in 1921, he had attended a medical and osteopathy college. He lost interest in the Medical and Osteopathic Courses, because he could not concur with the philosophies as taught.

After graduation from National, Dr. Reeves was connected with the Manus Table Company designing the Manus Chiropractic table. He remained with this company until 1928, although he taught Technic privately until 1925, at which time - due to the influence of Dr. W.A. Budden, who was then Dean of the National College - he became associated with National teaching Technic and Chiropractic philosophy until 1928.

As early as 1908, Dr. Reeves had arrived at the modern day theory of the subluxation, but it was not until 1925 did he introduce his ideas of neurophilosophy. Dr. Budden requesting that he teach it at the National College. In 1926 he introduced the text book, "Symptoms of Visceral Disease," by Portier at National and today this book is accepted by most schools as a standard text.

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

### LABORATORY NEWS

With the advent of summer and vacation certain laboratory items again become manifest—the plastic embedding of biological specimens, the inevitable experiments on the chiropractic adjustment and its manifestation by suparrenal activity i.e. 7-keto-steroid levels the completion of the blood pictures of hamsters that have been exposed to various types of colored lights—a revamping of the physiology laboratory experiments with special attention to the neurological aspects thereof. All of these items and many more will be the lot of the summer group in the laboratory to work with.

A practical laboratory procedure for the office: The concentration of sputum for acid fast Bacilli has long been a messy job for office practice, we offer you today an easy and quick method for doing so.

#### Reagents: Purex or Chlorox.

Method: Mix at least 5 cc of sputum with equal amounts of reagent and shake well, let stand for 10 min. and centrifuge at a moderate speed for 5 min. Pour off the supernatant solution and smear the sediment on slides for the stain. When slides are dried well stain with a good acid fast method such as the Zee-Nelsen or Kinyoun s.

Questions on Laboratory procedure are appreciated and will be answered regularly. Address questions to E.G. Samuel D.C., N.D., Director Clinica Laboratory.





## MINOR SURGERY











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## EUROPEAN NEWS

Editors note: The following report has been received from Dr. W.J.C. Cleave, 15 Royal Terrace, Glasgow, Scotland Secretary of the European Chiropractic Union which we think is of interest to the entire Chiropractic profession.

The first Annual Conference of the European Chiropractic Union was held in Oslo on June 9-10 and 11th. Dr. H. Langer (Switzerland) officiated as chairman for the three day session. Telegrams of greetings were read from Dr. F.W.H. Illi and Dr. J. Ohmans of St. Bernardino, California, and letters from C.E.R. Bannister (Belfast), Dorothy Elliot (Bristol), H. Neill Ashton (London) and Dr. Vinton Logan (St. Louis, Missouri).

Dr. A.E. Lundh, President of the Norwegian Chiropractic Association, extended a very warm welcome to all the visiting Chiropractors.

The assembly stood in silence, as a tribute to the memory of Dr. Reidunn Sverre who passed away on May 6th. The ECU lost a keen and active worker, a true and faithful Chiropractor, she was beloved by all her patients. For many years she has served as Secretary-Treasurer of the Norwegian Association. Much progress has been made since we held our inaugural meeting in Copenhagen in 1951. It is with pleasure that we are able to report, that with the exception of one Association, Western Europe has bonded itself into one solid union for Chiropractic. It is our earnest hope that before another year passes, we will be able to report that we are 100% Chiropractors throughout the severeral associations have worked very hard, and to all of them we owe a debt of gratitude.

The fine spirit displayed, augurs well for the success of our organization. Everybody who attended this conference has gone away refreshed and uplifted, and returned home with a better insight into Chiropractic.

Progress reports were received from Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Switzerland, France, Belgium, Austria and Scotland.

Highly instructive lectures and demonstrations in technique were given by Dr. Henri Gillet, Dr. H.A. Simonsen demonstrated "Painless Cervical Adjusting". Dr. H. Langner gave an interesting lecture on Body Mechanics. Dr. Joshua N. Haldeman of South Africa, former vice-president Canadian Chiropractors Association and board of Control I.C.A., had as his subject "Office Procedure

and Simplified Technique". Dr. E.O. Rames M.D., D.C., gave two excellent talks, one on manipulation of the Ganglion Impar, and another on What a Medical Doctor thinks of Chiropractic. Dr. R. Bosshard, a fairly recent graduate of the Lincoln College took as his subject "What a Chiropractic School OUGHT to be".

These lectures and demonstrations were presented in such a way that they offered a complete refresher course, and aroused so much interest, that by popular vote, one evening's entertainment was cancelled to allow extra time for technique.

Business sessions were snappy, and a great deal of work was gone through with peace and harmony prevailing all the time. Special votes of thanks were expressed for the wonderful cooperation of the N.C.A. Council on Education and all the N.C.A. Accredited Colleges for their valuable help during the past year.

A Council of Education was set up to correlate and report next year on the advisability of establishing a school somewhere in Europe.

The question of a World Federation was also discussed, and it is to be hoped that as soon as we are, ourselves, a solid group in Europe, that one of our aims will be towards the creation of a world federation, by linking up all the American and other National Bodies. Correspondence has already been entered into, and we have received many favourable comments. It is to be hoped that this idea will be discussed at the various National Conventions, so that in the near future such a Federation might be brought into being.

Compared with the American and Canadian Associations, the E.C.U. is only a small group, but what it lacks in numbers, is more than offset by the zeal of our members.


On the entertainment side, there were two very enjoyable sight-seeing trips, and on the last night a banquet and dance.


Our next conference will be in Paris in July 1953, and we extend a hearty invitation to our American and Canadian Colleagues to plan now to be with us.
