

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Chiropractic Technic

By Dr. D.J. Metzinger

BICIPITAL TENDON SLIP TECHNIC

A condition in which the tendon of the long head of the biceps muscle has slipped out of the bicipital groove on the humerus at the shoulder. This is produced by a sudden twisting of the arm while above shoulder level with simultaneous contraction of the biceps muscle. Often called baseball arm or strap hangers arm but often caused by falls or work when in position described above. After tendon has become displaced it takes a short cut forcing the humerus to rotate—limiting movements and producing pain symptoms by pressure.

Suspect this condition in all shoulder involvement particularly if patient is unable to raise arm to the horizontal laterally but can raise it forward. Diagnosis complete upon finding bicipital groove empty and locating tendon out of groove. This requires much palpation with care.

To correct if tendon is in front of the groove (right arm).

Position of patient: Seated on adjustment table.

Position of adjuster: Standing at patient's right facing patient. Stand on left leg putting right foot on table with right knee supporting patient's right upper arm—horizontally with patient's elbow flexed, forearm ceilingward. Adjustor grasps patient's right wrist with his left hand.

Contact: Anterior side of bicipital tendon with ball of right thumb while anchoring hand with fingers hooked over patient's right shoulder.

Thrust: No thrust is given, instead the adjustors left hand rotates patient's right humerus using the forearm as a lever until the bicipital groove moves forward under the tendon which is being held by the right hand thumb. When the tendon drops into groove lower patient's arm to side to retain tendon in place. It is well to restrict patient's arm to side for about a week to prevent re-slip.

For left arm-reverse positions.

For a backward slip stand behind patient.

The American Medical Association, at their clinical session in Los Angeles last month, again verified that Chiropractic has them worried. At least we feel that, for such a great and astute body to take the time from their own business,

to pass the following resolution, they know that Chiropractic has many of the answers and is a definite threat to their attempted monopoly of the healing arts. The resolution, in part, is as follows: "Whereas it has been scientifically demonstrated that Chiropractic is without merit as a healing art and that there is no current need in the Armed Forces for graduates of schools offering such instruction, therefore be it resolved that the A.M.A. hereby protest against the promulgation of any regulation by the Selective Service system under which students of Chiropractic may be deferred under the Universal Military Training and Service act of 1951 as amended".

Since Chiropractic students are now deferred the same as other students in the healing arts, we feel that the Act will remain as it now stands, and that we Chiropractic students can rest assured that the National Chiropractic Association will be most vigilant in seeing that it does.

Some forty million Americans have found the answer to their health problems (many of them after complete failure by the Medical Doctors) with Chiropractic. Therefore it must be pointed out that the "Scientific demonstrations" referred to in the resolution were somewhat prejudiced and incomplete.

As for "no current need in the Armed Forces for Chiropractic graduates', and a department of Chiropraxis, we can say from personal experience that had Uncle Sam had a department of Chiropraxis, he would have received more man hours during World War II from us, as we could never find an M.D. who could repair a sacroiliac slip. Those three months on the partially disabled list were wasted, where a Chiropractor would have had the trouble repaired within an hour, (and did, too.) We believe that the Armed Forces need Chiropractors and a department of Chiropraxis. We know that many, many service men and ex-service men agree with us.

Now something about public relations. This is something we can all use in our daily practice.

May I call to your attention an article that appears in the December is sue of our N.C.A. Journal, page 18, by Dr. H.F. Mahaney. Here are the first four of twelve compelling points that should influence us to try this modern, helpful public relations program.

"(1) The new patients brought into your office with flamboyant newspaper advertising never will stick with you and must be resold on the merits of chiropractic with each visit, New patients brought into your office through the althways are always thoroughly sold on the value of chiropractic.

(2) You never will see the bottom of your flour barrel if you will use and continue to use Healthways consistently. It will bring the desired results of good public relations and increased practice.

(3) Any successful professional or business man must have a definite plan and follow that plan. My plan, which I have used for years with Healthways, is to take the names of my new patients at the end of each month and send them a year's subscription to Healthways. These patients are interested in chiropractic or they never would visit my office in the first place. People are reluctant to throw away their old magazines; they usually give their magazines to a neighbor or friend, so several different families may read this one subscription.

(4) Have you tried a public relations program in your city with Healthways? Here in Tampa, for the past several years, eight chiropractors out of twelve of us have been sending 365 copies of Healthways Magazine each year to all union barber shops and beauty shops. At a cost of only \$45 for each of us, we tell the public 4,380 times, in one year, the chiropractic story in a dignified manner without any scare copy of testimonials. Doctor, think how many many times your Healthways subscription will be read by your prospective patient. If you want better public acceptance in your city, order two or three hundred copies of Healthways sent to your public officials, barber and beauty shops, etc. Once you see the new patients visit your office who never thought about chiropractic before you will know the best answer is Healthways."

Last and very important, is our N.C.A. membership program. I am sure that all of you have received a report from our N.C.A. president, Dr. George F. Kelley.



SIMPLE HYDROCHLORIC ACID TEST. 1, Fill a small No. 00 capsule with ether. 2. Put capsule in tip of a rubber finger cot. 3. Tie the finger cot just above the capsule with No. 2 cat gut and tie with a double knot. 4. Clip off the extra rubber. 5. Have patient take ether filled capsule home with him and swallow it with a glass of water and about 2 ozs. bread. Note time of taking.

HOW THE TEST WORKS. The bread and water will cause the stomach to secrete acid. Acid will start to work on the cat gut and in time will cause it to break so the acid can then get to the enclosed capsule. The acid then breaks the capsule and it releases the ether. The ether for gas in the stomach is expelled thru the mouth in the form of a good sized burp.

RESULTS. 1. If burp comes in less than an hour, too much acid.

2. If burp comes between 1 and 1 ½ hours, NORMAL.

 Over 1½ hours indicates Hypoacidity.

It is well to check into the hydrochloric acid of your patients and especially those past 50 who are females.



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
