



The immediate task on hand in 1953 cannot be found. Three months of arduous hard work is in store for this committee, experience, know how and splendid team work.


An aggressive, affirmative and approved legislative program is ready for presentation. Three months of arduous hard work is in store for this committee, plus personal sacrifice.

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
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## ALUMNI BREAKFAST

**Correction of Medial and Anterior Subluxation of the knee as presented by Dr. A.L. Schultz, Mitchell, South Dakota at the O.A.C.P. Symposium held in Portland in December. Future issues of the Synergist will carry more of this technic.**

**Position of Patient:** Prone, bracing himself against the adjusting table step, and grasping sides of table for additional support.

**Technic:** The Doctor grasps the leg above the malleoli with his hands in the position shown in photograph. Then rotate the leg inward as far as possible. Gently shake the leg 2 or 3 times for relaxation. Be sure that the right forearm is placed in such a manner that it contacts the patient's instep, and the line of the arm passed diagonally over the cuboid bone. Then use firm traction until the patient relaxes, and give a snappy pull toward yourself. This may have to be repeated 2 or 3 times until the adjustment is felt.


