The office of Legal Counsel to your association has, at this writing, been in operation 4 1/2 months. It is our desire to make report and evaluation, although it may be too early to make any definite observations.

Your attorneys have been called on to render personal legal

services in several instances. Each was concluded to the satisfaction of the doctor involved, we believe, and payment for services was made privately.

This office has been asked for three written opinions, two of which have been rendered, the other is still pending.

We have met with various committees and groups of the association to plan strategy, discuss possible legislative activity, and have been called upon for advice and counsel by the members of the Chiropractic Board.

We have recently been successful in obtaining recognition, by the Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Co. of Los Angeles, of Chiropractors as "duly licensed physicians" within the meaning of their contract of insurance. It would not be fair to take the credit exclusively unto ourselves for this accomplishment. Much of the credit belongs to Dr. W. A. Budden, Director of Western States College, who helped immeasureably in the successful conclusion of the matter.

It would be appropriate here to mention that in all things this office has been called upon to perform the extreme friendly cooperation by Drs. Budden, Dunham, Gallagher, Klier, McCarthy, Peffley, Rutz, Von Pier and Wood and in fact many others.

At present there is pending a dispute with another insurance company over the interpretation of their clause: "duly licensed physician." The details in the case will be discussed at a later time after the conclusion of the matter. To discuss it now would serve no useful purpose and might impede negotiations.

We deem it a real privilege and pleasure to be associated with your profession and sincerely look forward to serving you in the future.

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
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Chiropractic Technic

OCCIPITAL BONE CORRECTION

With patient prone, palpation reveals occipital bone inferior on one side while temporal bones are equal. The occipital bone will also be posterior on inferior side (usually the left) and suture on same side will be also posterior. Tenderness and muscle cording will be found on same side.

CORRECTION:

Position of patient: Prone with head turned so posterior inferior side of occipital is uppermost.

Position of adjustor: At side of table opposite to the way patient is facing (R. side for L.P.I. occipital).

CONTACT:

Side of pisiform against inferior margin of occipital bone near junction with temporal. Fingers of contact hand point same direction as patient's chin.

Other hand: Grasps wrist of thrust hand.

THRUST:

Given with a forward swinging action of the elbow, pivoting at the finger tips and shoulder socket.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{DIRECTION}}$ OF THRUST: Superior and anterior.

DEPTH OF THRUST:

Limited. Approximately one inch thrust.

SPEED OF THRUST:

Explosive.

Remarks: Repeat several times successively until palpation reveals satisfactory correction.

CORRECTING OLECRANON PROCESS SLIPPED MEDIALLY

This type of slip may cause symptoms at shoulder, elbow or wrist.

POSITION OF PATIENT:

Seated or standing with arm to be corrected extended in front palm upward.

POSITION OF ADJUSTOR:

Facing patient. Grasp patient's wrist (patient's right with adjustor's left).

CONTACT:

The medial side of the olecranon process with the base of index finger of adjustor's other hand.

DIRECTION OF THRUST:

Directly lateral. No thrust must be given with hand holding wrist.


DEPTH OF THRUST:

Very limited.

SPEED OF THRUST:

Spontaneous.

To correct an olecranon process slipped laterally reverse hands and direction of thrust.


A date will be set in March for our first regular District meeting. All members will be notified of the exact time. This meeting will be held in Baker, which is more or less centrally located. Please plan to be there.

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
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DISSECTION


MINOR SURGERY



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
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
