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

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NSA PRESIDENT SPEAKS BEFORE STUDENT BODY

The Student Body meeting of April 23 was heralded a success by popular acclamation. The main speaker, Bill Dentzer, president of the U.S. National Students Association, held the students attention with his knowledge of international student relationships. His presentation of existing world problems and their bearing on the students throughout the globe was received by our assembly with a sympathetic and appreciative attitude.

Mr. Dentzer is a graduate of Muskingum College in Ohio, majoring in political science. Shortly after assuming the office of President of the N.S.A. in September, 1951, he set out for Toronto, Canada to attend the National Federation of Canadian University Students. Later he journeyed to Edinburgh, Scotland, and to Rio de Janeiro. The U.S. National Student Association consists of some 250 institutions of higher education with an enrollment of some 700,000 students. It's aim is to promote and encourage greater understanding of International problems. As Mr. Dentzer mentioned in his talk, we have a long trail to follow in our journey to international goodwill. One of the first steps is to wake up from our apathy and take an active interest in national and international affairs. The students of today will be the leaders of tomorrow. The aims and objects of this organization are, in the main, the development of cooperation between the various colleges: the encouragement of participation in civic and federal affairs, and the training of the college person to assume responsibilities he will have to assume in the not-too-distant

April 8, Student Body President Joe Boucher and Vice-President Herb Shepherd attended their inaugural meeting held at Marylhurst College, Ohter colleges represented at the meeting were: Reed College, Lewis & Clark College, Portland University, Concordia College, Providence School of Nursing, & Multnomah College.

TO CORRECT KNEE WITH TIBIA SLIPPED ANTERIORLY

POSITION OF PATIENT: Supine, thigh and knee flexed.

POSITION OF ADJUSTOR:

Back towards patient at side of table, same side as knee to be corrected. Grasp patient's ankle with both hands, with patient's knee near adjustor's axilla.

DIRECTION OF THRUST:

Floorward traction on ankle, given with a body drop.

DEPTH OF THRUST:

About an inch from contact point.

SPEED OF THRUST: Spontaneous.

TO CORRECT KNEE WITH TIBIA SLIPPED POSTERIORLY

POSITION OF PATIENT: Supine, thigh and knee flexed.

POSITION OF ADJUSTOR:

Facing patient at side of table, same side as knee to be corrected. Grasp patient's ankle with one hand while inserting fleshy part of other forearm in patient's popliteal space to use as a fulcrum.

DIRECTION OF THRUST:

Towards patient's buttock with hand holding ankle.

DEPTH OF THRUST:

About an inch from tension point.

SPEED OF THRUST:

Spontaneous.

TO CORRECT KNEE WITH LATERAL-LY SLIPPED TIBIA

POSITION OF PATIENT: Supine.

POSITION OF ADJUSTOR:

At side of patient facing knee to be adjusted.

CONTACT POINT:

Lateral epicondyle of tibia with pisiform contact while other hand grasps ankle to use as a fulcrum.

DIRECTION OF THRUST:

Medially. No thrust is to be given to the ankle.


DEPTH OF THRUST:

Limited, about onehalf inch from tension point.

SPEED OF THRUST:

Spontaneous.

A medial slip of tibia may be corrected similarly by reversing positions and direction of thrust.

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





A FEW IDEAS ON CALCIUM

Calcium, by percentage fifth among the elements represented in the human organism, holds this same relative position among the elements of the earth's crust, in which we include the oceans and the atmosphere. Composing up to 99 percent of the human skeleton, it is of vital importance to height, conformation and strength. Calcium is also important in many physiological processes.

Calcium is essential to the normal action of the heart and to the coagulation of the blood; it is concerned in the physiology of the nerve conduction and probably in energy exchange of muscle contraction; it influences the growth of specific organs and (together with phosphorus) is of influence in the absorption of the end products of digestion and in the retardation of intestinal putrefaction.

To be normal and healthy the full grown human body must be richer in calcium than in any other mineral element; YET EVERY HUMAN BEING IS BORN CALCIUM POOR.

Nature assures an easier birth by having the bones flexible at delivery. Flexible bones and hence bodies of lowered calcium content. Once the danger of birth is past, it is to the advantage of the young organism to recover from the handicap of it's low-calcium condition as rapidly as possible. Hence the extreme importance of liberal calcium intake for the growing child. The addition of Vitamins D, B-complex and C to increase absorption of and utilization of calcium intake during this period is important.

Space will not allow a review of all the disorders attributable to calcium deficiency, maternal tetany should be mentioned, however, with its symptoms of insomnia, increased irritability of disposition, edema not associated with heart or kidney disease, cramp-like or aching pains of the lower extremities and a tingling or burning sensation sometimes only in the fingers and toes. We should also mention the high incidence of dental caries among those on calcium deficient diet and such factors as stunted growth, weak muscles and osseous abnormalities in youth.

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
