

Your insurance committee has begun a progressive program which is designed to increase recognition in Oregon and to ultimately wipe out discrimination.



Final formulation of this letter will not be attempted until a similar letter being formulated by Dr. Murphy's N.C.A. Public Relations office is studied to see if it will serve our purposes in Oregon.

Consideration is being given to the printing of a large number of cards which may be used by doctors with their monthly statements asking the question, "Does your insurance policy include chiropractic coverage?"

Also consideration is being given to sending a letter or questionnaire to the various insurance companies to determine their policy and experiences relative to chiropractic physicians and chiropractic coverage.


Miss Vivian Gauld and Norman Enridge gave their expert interpretations of the difficult folk dances of the European continent.



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
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
