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IN MEMORIUM TO RANDALL H. VINCENT

Memorial services were held on Dec. 1st, for Randall Hough Vincent, a Sophomore at W.S.C.C., who drowned in a boating accident Nov. 14, 1971. The services were led by Dr. Robert Elliot. The student body and several close relatives were in attendance.

We all knew Randy as an enthusiastic individual devoted to numerous friendships, traveling and his studies. He spent much of his vacation time meeting new friends. It seemed that he always was able to share with us some encounter he had experienced on his latest journey.

Last summer, while in London, he met with a CBS correspondent filming a TV special about American students abroad. On the program the following autumn, it was great to see Randy representing W.S.C.C. of Portland, Oregon on National television.

At W.S.C.C., Randy was an inspirational student, always concerned about his studies, motivated by a strong belief in the value of Chiropractic. His interest stemmed from his enlistment in the Army, when he served as a Dental assistant. A close army buddy, also a First Aid technician, was devoted to Chiropractic philosophy, and it was from him that Randy first learned of the benefits of this healing science. He received the spark which ignited his desire to become a Chiropractor.

To help pay for his tuition, Randy worked after school as a janitor. He used second-hand books which sometimes made his studies more difficult. He often spoke of the need for more scholarships and financial assistance for students at W.S.C.C.

So, in commemoration of Randy H. Vincent, W.S.C.C. hopes to establish the Randy Vincent Scholarship Fund, the success of which will depend upon donations from

those Chiropractors in the field committed to the perpetuation and betterment of the profession.

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#1 CHIROPRACTOR IN UTAH SPEAKS AT W.S.C.C.

It is the policy of our school to offer students the broadest scope of practice and philosophy available. In accordance with this policy, it has been our privilege to listen to various speakers who have presented Chiropractic as it relates to their philosophy.

The most recent guest speaker was Dr. Hugh Wayman of Salt Lake City, Utah. Dr. Wayman, brother of Dr.

Emery L. Wayman of Portland, has been in practice for more than 25 years and has the largest practice in Utah. In addition to himself, his wife and two children are also Chiropractors. While his daughter does not practice, his son and wife both have large practices of their own.

Dr. Wayman's lecture emphasized the importance of watching our own health as well as that of our patients. It has been his experience to see doctors retire or die early in their career due to poor health. Emphasizing the great need for as many Chiropractors as possible, he feels it is a great loss to the profession to lose such fine doctors due, for the most part, to neglect.

One of the more humorous elements of his talk was the reminiscence of past days when Chiropractic wasn't quite what it is today. Also he joked of past educational requirements and conditions comparing them to the present day requirement and up-to-date diagnostic procedure employed by most D.C.s.

Dr. Wayman placed much emphasis on the need for students to decide what they want (establishing goals) and constantly working toward those goals, not only for the establishment of a practice, but also for any area that you wish to develop such as health, finances, happiness, etc.

Much was learned by many students, thanks to Dr. Hugh Wayman of Utah.

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The following letters are in response to Mike Lang's editorial in the last issue in regard to Dr. Gold's lecture:

"I just can't let Michael G. Lang's article in the last Quantum Libet go without some rebuttal. I must realize, however, that the views of a student are not the same as one after some years of practice. I would like to point out a few things, however, as I attended the same oecture by Dr. Gold as well as several others previously.

"After a chiropractor has removed a massive interference factor such as a subluxation, he has done all that needs to be done chiropractically. Granted, perhaps, some of the other things may be necessary (vitamin therapy, obstetrics, and gynecology, proctology, minor surgery), but we shouldn't be the profession responsible, for that is out of our field. That is the treatment of symptoms which is strictly medical, by definition. Should we also pull teeth, administer religious council, treat sex needs, fit glasses, cut corns, pinch pimples -- these things would also "help" the patient, but it is a little ridiculous, isn't it. Let's start to become adjusting chiropractors, that is at least one thing that no one else can do and it is the most important thing, after all, in getting sick people well.

"Dr. Gold is not forcing a narrow scope of practice onto the chiropractic profession and he has not chosen the easiest way out nor is he providing a minimum of service to his patients. By adjusting subluxations and restoring life power he is doing the maximum that can possibly be done to help that individual chiropractically. He is certainly not being a para-medic and treating symptoms, which is a fools game. He is practicing the only method and scope of practice that chiropractors need to practice".

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"I have read with keen interest your remarks in the Journal of the ACA, Nov. 1971 regarding the appearance of Dr. Reginald Gold of New York at WSCC in September.

"I am familiar with the philosophy espoused by Dr. Gold, having heard him numerous occasions. Let me first inform you that the scope of practice recommended by him at WSCC does not reflect the scope as promulgated in the statute of this State. We have the privilege of diagnosis, the use of manual and mechanical means of practice, the

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use of vitamin and supplemental food products and the use of the title "Doctor".

"While Dr. Gold negates the importance of the basic sciences, not only does the State of New York examine all applicants for licensure in those subjects, but the science of diagnosis demands competency in anatomy, physiology, pathology, biochemistry, microbiology, etc.

"I believe I can state without fear of contradiction that Dr. Gold's is a dying philosophy representative of but a small, but vociferous, minority. Personally, if that is his method and philosophy, well and good. However, don't attempt to infect the rest of us with it. We are on the threshold of a new era in chiropractic with wide acceptance by government, insurance industry and the public. For us to revert back to the "B.J." philosophy of the "adjustment of the spine by hand only" would be a serious blow to progress, and the acceptance of technician's status.

"I am pleased by your last sentence to them they cannot justify dictating a narrow practice policy for all chiropractic...". That is precisely my position and that of the great majority of my colleagues in New York."
